Portland, Dec. 9. Fancy creamery butter is firm at current quotations, as the supply of fresh cream continues to diminish daily.

Butter prices are not expected to advance, according to local creamery men. Butter is already quite high for Portland, and should scarcity of cream cause an advance in the price of fancy creamery, there would be an opening for butter to come in from California and other points where quotations would be lower than here.

Gold medal matches have advanced 10 cents per case and are quoted at \$1.75.
