

WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

J. H. Hendrickson Now Champion Blue Rock Shooter.

SCORES 94 OUT OF 100

Shooting Committee of New York Athletic Club Manages Affair—Three Traps Used by Men Who Were Divided Into Twelve Squads.

New York, Dec. 15.—J. H. Hendrickson, of Long Island City won the championship of America at clay birds yesterday with a score of 94 out of a possible 100. Only one point behind Hendrickson came J. W. Garrett, of Colorado Springs, one of the crack amateur shots of the West. The shoot was held on the Traverse Island grounds of the New York Athletic Club, and brought out 48 contestants. As a counter attraction there was a special shoot of professionals in which eight men took part, William Herr, of Kansas, being the winner, with a record of 96 out of a possible 100. He was the only professional who beat the best amateurs.

The shooting committee of the New York Athletic Club managed the affair. Three traps were used and the men were divided into twelve squads. There was practically no wind, but the sun made a strong glare over the water, which was rather trying on the eyes.

Only four men made straight scores of 25. Hendrickson made one in his third string. Garrett made a grand finish getting every bird in his last string. H. W. Brigham of the Crescent Athletic Club, made two perfect scores of 25, the only shooter, with the exception of Herr, in the professional match, who made two complete scores. Herr had an easy victory. His nearest opponent was Henry S. Welles of this city who made 89.

The silver loving cup emblematic of the amateur championship at clay birds was presented to Mr. Hendrickson. Mr. Garrett explained that the reason for his presence as a competitor was due to the fact that he came to New York this week with A. H. McKenie of Denver to lay before the committee in charge of the Grand American handicap, the claims of Denver for that big event next year.

WILL CALL EXTRA SESSION.

Helena, Dec. 16.—As a result of the organization of the Montana Rate Association in this city yesterday, Governor Toole will be requested to call the legislature in extra session to pass a railroad commission bill. At the last session of the legislature a bill was passed on the last day of the session and it was vetoed by the governor on the ground that it was unconstitutional. The resolution adopted by the rate conventions directs the executive committee to ascertain if the governor will issue a call for a special session of the legislature, if he is assured a majority of the members will support a measure that will conform to his ideas as expressed in his veto message last year.

The executive committee of the association was directed to collect data showing discrimination by the railroads in Montana and to bring proceedings before the interstate commerce commission. Arrangements were made to provide funds to carry out the instructions.

F. J. Edwards of this city, was elected permanent president of the association, and R. A. Fraser also of Helena, secretary.

TO ABOLISH PASSES.

New York, Dec. 15.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Trunk lines association yesterday the abolition of free passes on the railroads included in the association were discussed. Any decision in the matter of abolishing passes, it was said, rested finally with the presidents of the several lines. The committee adopted a resolution recommending that all passes designed as inducements to secure business be discontinued. The question of abolishing passes altogether was left to the individual lines.

EPIDEMIC OF HOG CHOLERA.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 16.—The epidemic of hog cholera which broke out at Chilliwack several weeks ago has developed startling proportions, and drastic measures are being taken to stamp it out. Dr. Moore and Dr. Lawson, of the Dominion government, veterinary department, have taken up the fight, and five hundred hogs were destroyed today.

FEAR OF UPRISING

Alexandria Authorities Prepare For Demonstration.

MUSULMEN HATE CHRISTIANS

Governor Has Convoled all Religious Sheiks and Harangued Them Asking Them to Enjoin the Faithful to Live in Harmony With Christians.

New York, Dec. 15.—A cable dispatch to the Herald from Alexandria Egypt, says: Fears are prevalent that an anti-Christian demonstration will take place Sunday, but the authorities are confident that they will be able promptly to repress and disturbances. Every precaution has been taken.

The governor yesterday convoled all the religious sheiks and harangued them, asking them to enjoin the faithful in the mosques to preserve a calm attitude and live in harmony with the Christians. The Latin archbishop and the Greek patriarch are exercising their influence in a similar direction in the church.

Gunsmith shops have been closed by the police.

Rumors of pending increase in the army of occupation are denied in well informed quarters. At the time of the crisis following the demonstration of the powers against the porte dispatches from Constantinople gave a warning that the coercion of the porte by Europe would be followed by an uprising on the part of the Mussulmans.

This uprising was to be regarded as affecting the whole Moslem world.
