Portland, Dec. 16,-Potato buyers find it difficult to secure fancy stock in Oregon, on account of growers desiring to hold for better okers. "The temporary weeks ago is responsible for this condition," a buyer said today, "as dealers paid better prices than the export demand justified. These high priced potaties are still in the warehouses in Portland, and were they shipped to San Francisco, a loss of 20c per sack would result. Growers, however, do not fancy, 7; head, choice, 61c. realize this, and in holding their fancy stock for higher prices they run the risk of loss, The California market is well supplied with Salinas Burbanks, and until these are exhausted there will be no better offers for Oregon potatoes.

"In the meantime there are plenty of second grade potatoes on the market, and as these cannot be shipped they must be consumed at home. This condition keeps the price of the poorer quality of spuds down to 50e or 60e per 100 pounds in the country."
