BLACK SAND VALUES

Another Interesting Report From Dr. David Day.

Dr. Aug. C. Kinnew informs the Astorian that he is just in receipt of another interesting report and detail on the Clatsop black sand values, from the hands of Dr. David Day, the government expert, who has given such voluminous and invaluable aid and information in this relation.

The late report is based upon expert tests made at the Lewis and Clark labratory, at Portland, and shows after a thorough separation by magnetic machines, a residum of 176 pounds of magnetic iron and 6 pounds of chromide of iron, per ton of sand.

This result is the more remarkable, inasmuch as the sands examined were averaged and taken from many borings and then mixed. They were taken from the tide-lands lying immediately west or the steel bridge at the mouth of Young's Bay.

"Christmas time is once more here, and I desire to again call the attention of all to the danger in connection with Christmas tree exercises. Christmas greens, cotton and the like, are very inflammable, and the greatest caution should be used; I would advise that, wherever it is possible, electioned and find that there is plenty of tric lights be used in the place of canprovisions, and clothing, sufficient to dles, as a great deal of danger may be

> See that all doors are unfastened; that all aisles are clear and don't allow crowding around the tree. In case of fire, telephone the fire department immediately.
