Razor clams are likewise scarce, but there is a very great de mand. Fishermen are much mystified as to the reason for the non-arrival of the usual heavy run of smelt in the Cowlitz and Columbia rivers. But few fish have been caught thus far this season, while a year ago and in former seasons smelt were rather plentiful even at Thanksgiving.
