Potato dealers look for still lower prices. Advices from San Francisco say that California is well supplied with "Rivers," which are of unusually good quality this season. Oregon Burbanks that have so far been shipped South have not been up to their usual standard, and have therefore suffered in competition with the Salinas Burbanks.

"Prices of potatoes may go higher," said one dealer today, "but it will be late in the season, and after the supply of California-grown potatoes has been exhausted. Our San Francisco houses advise us not to ship until the prospects for prices are better in California and the terrorities of the Southwest than at present. We have a large number of Oregon Burbanks in the Portland warehouses. These were brought at higher prices than rule now, and we are therefore likely to lose money on them."

Fresh vs. Frozen Salmon,

Fresh salmon are scare; not enough are caught to supply the local demand. At the same time they are cheaper by le a pound than the cold storage article, which cannot be sold in competition with them. Cold storage plants are reported full of high-priced salmon, whose only market is in the East and abroad. Portland consumers do not like cold-storage salmon, as there is toomuch difference between the taste of the fresh and the frozen article.
