Miss Roosevelt and Longworth to
Live in Washington.

HOUSE IS FINELY FURNISHED

After the Marriage, Miss Roosevelt
Will Move all Her Oriental Gifts Into
the House. Longworth's Mother Will
Live With the Couple.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—For at least
two years after Miss Alice Roosevelt's
marriage to Congressman Nicholas
Longworth her residence will contin-
ue to be in Washington, as Mr. Long-
worth's second term is just commencing.
The Cincinnati Lochinvar and
his mother have leased the handsomely
furnished home of Mrs. John D.
Jones, who has taken up her perma-
nent residence in Europe.

The house is unpretentious but
to amply serve the young couple.

It has been occupied by Mr. Long-
of the family who have been in Wash-
ington this winter. Mrs. Longworth
brought with her oriental rugs of her
own, her own table linen and the fam-
ily plate. When the change in mis-
tresses takes place only the bride's
personal effects will be added to the
equipments already installed, as the
home is looked upon as only tempo-
rary. The many tokens of regard with
which she was showered in the orient
will always make her domicile, where-
ver it may be, the most attractive.
The plan of the house is somewhat
English. The first floor is very low,

is a beautifully carved buffet and two
tables of Florentine design. The din-
ner table is of solid walnut and the
seats of walnut beautifully uphol-
stered in tapestry. On the east wall
hangs a Gobelin tapestry on which
Christ and the disciples are depicted.
The hangings are of olive green lined
with old rose plush, those tints repeat-
ing the main tones of the tapestry. An
exquisite lamp over the table is of
more modern design than the other ap-
pointments, but harmonizes with the
color scheme.
