PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—Beef cattle are still plentiful and prices do not advance. A good many hay-fed beefs are coming in from various points in the northwest, but drovers who expected higher prices early in the winter have been disappointed. Range-fed stock has disappeared from the market for the season, and will not be fat enough for slaughter until about the first of June. Livestockmen who have fat cattle desire, of course, to sell them off as early in the season as possible, in order to save their fodder, which may be needed later on to tide the range stock over a snowy spell, in regions east of the mountains.

Sheep and Hogs.

Sheep and hogs are in good demand and the present high prices rather incline to an advance. Sheepraisers are not willing to let their stock go to the slaughterhouse, because wool promises to bring a good price in the spring. Hogs are high-priced because there are practically none in the northwest fit for pork, and stocks must be replenished from the Eastern hog-raising centers as the season progresses.

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On Sunday, December 17th, the Denver & Rio Grande railroad will inaugurate a daily line of standard and tourist sleeping cars between Denver and Los Angeles in connection with the new Clark road. Both cars will leave Denver daily at 9:30 a. m., and arrive at Salt Lake City at 1:35 p. m., the next day. At this point the cars will be held over until midnight, thus allowing through passengers the privilege of a stop-over of ten hours and a half in Salt Lake City. Eastbound, these cars will leave Los Angeles at 8 p. m., and arrive at Salt Lake City at 6:30 a. m., second morning where they will remain over until 3:50 p. m., thence to Denver where they will arrive at 4:20 the following afternoon. This stop-over at Salt Lake City of the regular line of sleeping cars promises to be an attractive feature for transcontinental travelers.
