

WILL NOT RESIGN.

Secretary Shaw Will Remain in Office Another Year,

CHICAGO, Jan. 13 .- A dispatch to the Chonicle from Washington says: 'At the meeting of the Cubinet yesterday President Roosevelt asked Secretary Shaw to remain at the head of the Treasury until March 4, 1907, and Mr. Shaw agreed to do so.

More than a year ago Mr. Shaw let it he known that he expects to retire from the Cabinet in February of this year. The President did not understand that this was the Secretary's wish until some unusual reference was made to it a few weeks ago, and then he lost no time in urging the Secratary to remain in the Cubinet until the end of the present session of Congress.



WILL INVESTIGATE.

Alleged Unlawful Deportation of Chi nese Causes Trouble.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.-Charle Mehan, head of the local Chinese bu roan, has received a telegram from Frank P. Sargent, commissioner of im migration, asking for his version of th trouble over the deportation of Le Wah and wife, and Chin Yoke, three Chinese, who were sent away on the Coptic on Wednesday last despite a order of the United States District Court. Fifteen minutes before the sail ing of the Coptic Judge De Haven o the United States District Court mad an order that the Chinese be held here until their case could be appealed Notice of this order was telephoned to the passenger agent of the Pacific Mail who agreed to hold the Chinese. He telephoned to Mehan about the mat ter and Mehan, it is said, in the face of the court order, insisted that they h deported.

The Chinese consul here, and the P cific Mail people, have telegraphed t Secretary Metcalf, asking that th three Chinese be landed at Honoluly and return here by the next boat.
