"Last year we paid 17c," said one heavy egg-buyer today, "and we sold for in 15 days. at 21c. People thought we made money on account of the 4c difference, but it when we took them out the 'cracks' and 'rots' used up the fourth cent. There was no money in this for us, and we will not be so anxious to buy eggs to put away this spring."

Today's receipts of fresh eggs were heavy, although shipments are usually light on Monday. Eastern stocks of cold storage eggs are well nigh exhausted, and importers are not preparing to receive any more this sea
