PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—Eggs are expected to decline in price if this weather keeps up. Strictly fresh are quoted today at 28c a dozen, but the price is weak. Cold storage men say they will wait this year until eggs get down to 15c before buying them to put by.

"Last year we paid 17c," said one heavy egg-buyer today, "and we sold at 21c. People thought we made money on account of the 4c difference, but it cost us 3c to put them on storage, and when we took them out the 'cracks' and 'rots' used up the fourth cent. There was no money in this for us, and we will not be so anxious to buy eggs to put away this spring."

Today's receipts of fresh eggs were heavy, although shipments are usually light on Monday. Eastern stocks of cold storage eggs are well high exhausted, and importers are not preparing to receive any more this season.

A large proportion of the fresh eggs reaching this city is sent direct to retail groceries, which even pay less than the 28c demanded on front street.
