INCENDIARISM

Fire Breaks Out in Saloon Building Does Notable Work Under Difficulty Property All Insured.

HLWACO, Wash., Jan. 15 (Special to Astorian).—The most disastous fire with which Ilwaco has had to contend in her history, broke out this morning at 3:20 o'clock in the rear of J. W. Donne's saloon, and that establishment, along with the jewelry store of H. A. Vincent, were both involved, the latter being totally destroyed and Doane's practically ruined, only the front of it remaining untouced.

These people were tenants, and carried insurance on their respective stocks. Doane for \$900, and Vincent for \$800.

The volunteer fire department of the town turned out to a man and did | splendid work in checking the progress of the flames to other and adjoining property, a piece of work peculiarly hard in the face of a stiff sea wind and a shortage of apparatus, the chemical engine's hose bursting upon the first weight of the pressure exerted by the big and cumbrous hand engine. But what was done in the way stopping the headway of the conflagration was done by sheer man-killing work, by the citi-zens, who never relinquished the task for a moment until every phase of headway of the conflagration was done the danger was passed.

MURDER TRIAL.

Texas Rangers Guard Prisoner on Trial For His Life.

BELLVILLE, Tex., Jan. 16,-The trial of W. T. Ekiridge, a wealthy citigen of San Antonio, indicted for the murder of W. E. Calhoun, came up here today and both sides announced they were ready for trial.

Eldridge shot and killed William Dunovant, his business partner, some time ago. On the trial he was acquitted. Afterwards an attempt was made to assassinate him, and he accused Calhoun, who was Dunovant's brother-inlaw. Last summer Eldridge saw Calhoun on a train near here and shot him to death.

Rangers have been sent here to remain during the trial.
