OSLER IS BLAMED.

CLEVELAND O., Jan. 16.—Upon Dr. Osler, who is noted for his "old age suicide" theory, is placed the blame of 50 suicides in Cleveland during the last year. Out of 83 cases of self destruction during 1905, fifty who killed themselves were past the age of forty years. In commenting upon the fact shown in the annual report of the health department for 1905, Health Officer Friedrich expressed the opinion that the agitation resulting from the Osler theory was responsible for the condition.

"Many persons reading the opinions of Dr. Osler concerning the age when men have passed their period of usefulness and the theory regarding being put out of the way when their period of usefulness is over, become despondent," said he.

RABBI'S REBEL.

Seminary Students Want to Have English Taught to Them.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—There was a strike yesterday in the Rabbinical Seminary. The Seminary has 160 students between the ages of 17 and 24 years studying to become rabbis. They declare that they will not resume their studies until the following demands are conceded.

- 1.—To have English taught.
- 2.—To be allowed to know more about affairs outside their religious routine.
- 3.—To study the bible in addition to the Talmud.
- 4.—To have modern methods and spirit injected into the school.

The principal is Rabbi Nahum Dahn of Slutsk, Russia.

WOMAN RECOVERS.

Kills Her Lover and Tries to End Her Own Life.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Lucille McLeod, who is supposed to have killed Walter Niemann while in a room at the Empire Hotel on December 30, and then shot herself, was taken from the Chicago Emergency Hospital to her home last night.

Before her removal a murder charge was placed against her name and her father, P. R. McLeod, and a friend had signed bonds of \$0,000 for her appearance at the inquest over Niemann's body, which is to be held January 27.

Miss McLeod and Niemann were found together in a room in the hotel after the firing of shots had attracted the attention of employees. When the door was broken open Niemann was found dying with a bullet wound in his head, and the young woman was unconscious with a bullet wound in her side. Both were hurried to the hospital, but Niemann died without regaining consciousness.

The revolver, which had been used, was found beneath Niemann's body on the bed when he was discovered. Ni-

man apparently had been shot from behind.

The physicians at the hospital said Miss McLeod has by no means recovered and that her wounds may yet prove fatal, but at present the chances are that she will recover.

MONSTER PETITION.

Boston "Constitution" Fanatics Will Ask Congress to Spare Ship.

BOSTON, Jan. 17.—Eric Pape, the artist, left Boston yesterday for Washington with the "Constitution petition," which he expects to present to Congress either today or tomorrow. While in Washington Mr. Pape will try to secure the signatures to the petition of many men prominent in national life, who have expressed themselves as favorable to the movement to save "Old Ironsides."

The petition is an immense affair and requires four men to carry it. It is estimated that over 20,000 persons have signed it. It is about 1 1/2 yards wide and 170 feet in length.

GOT OFF CHEAPLY

Certificate Forgers Borrowed Valid One For Use.

SETON'S TRIAL HAS BEGUN

An Investigation Into Norfolk and Western Stock Swindle Discloses That Perpetrators Borrowed Valid Certificates to Make Bogus Copies From.

NEW YORK, Jan.—The investigation swindle it was said yesterday, has disclosed the fact that the alleged instigators of the plot did not have to invest \$8,000, the amount needed to purchase a good 100 share certificate, from which to make bogus copies. Information has been obtained by the authorities showing, it was said, that the men borrowed 100 share certificates from a certain broker. The certificate was turned over to the engravers to be copied from, with certain variations.

Three boxes which Charles Augustus Seton had in the Standard Safe Deposit Company's vaults and which were taken to Assistant District Attorney Garvan's office yesterday, were examined. They disclosed all sorts of papers. A diploma issued to Seton—The name was spelled Seton by the Ohio Wesleyan University in 1893, was found, also the diploma he received from the high school at Plymouth, Ohio. There was also memoranda of accounts with three big stock exchange houses.

William A. Shoemaker, of Philadelphia, made a long statement to Mr. Garvin yesterday, in which he said that some time ago he had bought some old issues of Norfolk & Western securities and sold them in good faith and that was all he knew of the matter.

Seton's trial on the charge of grand larceny growing out of his transactions with the Houston & Galveston Interurban Railroad Company, will begin today.

WANT A RAISE.

Engineers and Firemen on P. B. & O. R. R. Want More Money.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—The engineers and firemen on the Pennsylvania and Baltimore & Ohio systems, it was reported yesterday, are dissatisfied with their pay. It is said they are preparing to ask for an increase.

In spite of the belief that the firemen of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad are taking a vote on the question of a strike, the officials here still think a strike a remote possibility.

President William E. Trausdale said last night that it was not true that he had referred First Vice-Grand Master Wilson and the grievance committee of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen back to General Manager Clarke from whom they appealed last week.

"I simply indorsed the stand taken by Mr. Clarke," he said. "The firemen have not been granted all they wanted, but concession after concession has been made, and they are better paid and are working under better conditions than the firemen on most of the other roads. I told their committee I believe with Mr. Clarke that they could not get any more concessions. I did not believe the firemen would take so foolish a step as to vote for a strike."

FAVOR OF FOOTBALL

Western Colleges Will Not Abolish the Great Game.

SOME REFORMS ARE NEEDED

Chicago Professor Says West Is Too Level Headed to do Away With Football—Reform Men Behind Game, Instead of Game Itself.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Members of the faculty of the University of Chicago believe the wave of "Football abolition" will not strike the conference colleges of the west. Dr. J. E. Ravcroft, acting head of the Department of Physical Culture, and Dean Eri B. Hulbert, head of the divinity school, and a member of the athletic board, hold that none of the Middle West institutions will do away with the game.

"I know that we would not think of abolishing the game at Chicago," said Dean Hulbert last night. "It is by far too good a game to lose. There are too many level headed men in the west to necessitate doing away with the sport. Reforms are needed, it is true, and it is expressly for this reason that the football conference will be held here on Friday. All talk of abolishing the game at any western college in the 'Big Nine' is pure nonsense."

Professor A. W. Small, professor of sociology, and one of the most influential men on the faculty, declared:

"It is nonsense to talk of abolishing football. I do not believe any representative of the conference colleges will advocate abolishing the game at the meeting on Friday. I am certain Chicago will not. Changes in rules will not do away with brutality or roughness in football. It is the men behind the game, the officials, and the spirit of the universities that count."

"Harvard's action has started anew the anti-football agitation, but the games never will be abolished in the colleges of the Middle West," said Dr. Ravcroft.

Chicago's attitude toward reforms in football has been definitely decided upon, according to a statement issued last night by Acting President Harry Pratt Judson. According to the statement "Definite instructions" have been given its representative. The representative will be Dr. Jordan.
