## WILL RAISE DUTY

Russia Will Raise Import Duties on Machinery.

TO PROTECT HOME INDUSTRY

Duties Are Raised for the Protection of American and German Manufacturers Who Have Invested Capital in Russia—United States Suffers.

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Washington, says:

On the first of March next the duties on machinery, electrical supplies, and other articles which are shipped

half of the new duties under a reciprocity treaty recently made between the two governments. Germany agrees to admit agricultural products from Russia at her minimum rates of duty under this treaty. German manufacturers of machinery, engines, motor, copper wire, electrical supplies and agricultural implements of all kinds will have a great advantage over American manufacturers who produce the same things.

### PAINTINGS SOLD.

Heber Bishop Collection of Paintings Sell For \$17,090.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—A total of \$117,000 was realized at last night's sale of paintings from the Heber Bishop collection. The highest price of the evening was brought by A. Schroyer, "Bulgarian Smugglers," which started off at \$5,000, the highest opening bid of the evening, and ran up to \$13,000. ## EDUCATED GRAFTER

College Graduate Ready to Graft as Uneducated Man.

### SACRIFICES INDEPENDENCE

Charles H. Hughes, Insurance Investigator Says Young Man Comes Out of College With Sole Idea of "Getting On"—Sacrifices Independence.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—In his address at the dinner of the Brown University Club last night, Charles E. Hughes, counsel to the Armstrong insurance committee touched incidentally on the legislative inquiry recently concluded. Among other things he said:

"When sport cultivates the sentiment that money is the best thing, then sport is a bad thing.

"When we look about us we see that college men in the world are quite as ready to get their share of the graft as men who have not had an education. Nowadays the young man comes out of college with the sole idea of 'getting on.' To do this he is willing to sacrifice his independence and his sense of honor. He will become the tool of a political leader and will put himself in a position of moral servitude to please him.

"When it is made plain that they must stand on their merits the young men will feel a spirit of emancipation. Strip fictitious reputations. Have publicity and enforce the law.

### JOE GANS WINS.

Colored Fighter Knocks Out Sullivan in Fifteenth Round.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—Joe Gans, rejuvenated, put up the fight of his life, and knocked out Mike (Twin) Sullivan in the fifteenth round tonight. From the start to the finish Gans was the aggressor and kept right on top of his man. Sullivan made several brave rallies but could not hurt the colored man and finally in the fifteenth round a series of lightning right hand blows to the jaw ended Sullivan's aspirations, and put Gans once more at the top of the fighting heap. The fight was fast and furious from the start.

## A STATE OF SIEGE

Bogota Declared to Be in State of Siege for Few Days.

### CONSPIRATORS ARRESTED

Government is Declared to Be in Perfect Control of the Situation and Will Try the Three Conspirators in Short Time.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Louis E. Bonilla, consul-general at New York for the United States of Columbia, today made public the following cable dispatch received by him from President Reyes and dated Bogota, January 18: "Capital is declared in state of siege in order to judge conspirators with perfect calmness. Siege will be raised within a few days. Absolute tranquillity prevails throughout the country." The conspirators alluded to are Felipe Angelo and three others arrested last December for trying to overthrow the government of President Reyes. Their arrest was followed by considerable agitation in the capital and throughout the country.

Consul-General Bonilla had this comment to make on the new plan:

"It was considered best by President Reyes, doubtless, to put the capital in a state of siege—which means merely declaration of martial law—in order that the trial might not be disturbed in any way and that perfect justice be secured. There is no revolution in Columbia. The government is secure and the people content with President Reyes."

in large quantities from the United States to Russia will be taxed nearly 100 per cent more than at present. The duties are to be raised for the protection of American, German, and other manufacturers who have been induced to build factories and invest capital in the Russian empire. This is the second time that the Russian government has increased its import duties upon such merchandise for the same reason and the manufacturers of the United States are the principal sufferers.

Last year our direct exports to Russia were about \$10,000,000, but our indirect exports through Hamburg and other European markets were very much larger. The principal direct exports to Russia last year were as follows:

Agricultural implements, \$3,812,705; \$2,245,945; cotton goods, \$5,510,147.

There was also a large quantity of iron and steel electrical supplies and other manufactures. On the first of March the duties on all these articles will be raised 25 to 100 per cent, which are practically prohibitory. German manufacturers of these articles who are practically our only competitors, will receive concessions of about one-

Japanese Representative Sees School Girls Give Athletic Exhibition.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Nagai Michiaki, an accredited representative of the Japanese government, witnessed a special exhibition by the girl athletes of the girls branch of the public schools athletic league. The Japanese has come to this country to study the methods of physical culture in the public schools, and also the workings of the athletic clubs, with the idea of adapting its best features to the physical upbuilding of the boys and girls of Japan. More than half a hundred girls took part in the relay racing running, and other sports, and Mr. Michiaki expressed himself as well pleased.
