PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—This has been a fair week for chickens, although prices weakened somewhat toward the last. Dealers expect to clean up on front street, and no chickens are likely to be held over Sunday.

Indications are for lower prices for next week," said a representative of Toft & Co., today, "as there appears to be more chickens in the country tributary to this city than were expected. The high prices realized a week ago have had the effect of larger receipts, and as demand is limited at such prices, a break must take place should heavy supplies continue."
