PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—Poultry dealers expect chicken prices to be somewhat lower this week than last, and that the top quotation for good fat hens will be about 13¢. Toward the close of last week chickens came in more numerous than usual, and in order to get rid of all that came in Saturday, commission men were obliged to cut prices to some extent.

This week the heavy retail dealers are said to be pretty well stocked up with live chickens, which have to be fed from day to day, and such dealers are not likely to buy fresh stock unless prices come down or the demand for high-priced fowls becomes stronger.

Other dealers' things have become scarce as the laying season advances, because poultrymen will not ship in hens that are laying, while egg prices are on a paying basis. Roosters are more likely to form the bulk of the receipts from now on, according to such dealers, and as old roosters are not wanted, the price of such is likely to decline materially.

A good many fancy onions are being shipped to San Francisco by rail.
