**LAST DAY OF TERM**

County Court Meets and Makes Final Orders.

**ALL ARE OF THE MINOR SAT**

Land Privilege Granted Deane and Foot—Bridge Lanterns Contracted For—Road Master Frye's Bond Fixed—Notes of the Day.

The Hon. County Court of Clatsop held its final days session yesterday, the three commissioners being in attendance, and the entire grist of matters pending for consideration being disposed of in good shape.

The petition of W. R. Dean and A. H. Foot, for privilege of constructing and mooring a float at the Lewis & Clark bridge No. 2, for the purpose of maintaining a landing for their milk business was considered by the court and granted, provided that the float in no way obstructed navigation nor interfered with the operation of the bridge.

The court appointed Frank Cunningham as supervisor of the New Astoria Road District with bonds fixed at \$200.

The petition of the Seaside Spruce Lumber Company, for permission to use one of the county's large road scrapers was granted by the court on the stipulation that the best of care be taken of it and that it be returned in good order.

From among several bids for furnishing the county with brass bridge lanterns, that of S. H. Willett of this city was accepted on a basis of \$96.00 for twenty-two lanterns.

The court fixed the bond of Road Master John Frye at the sum of \$2,000 in which sum Mr. Frye will qualify in due time.

It being ascertained that an error had been made in the name of the party to have been appointed as road supervisor of Road District No. 16, the name of William Moody was stricken from the list, and Victor Michaelson was substituted.

The county clerk was directed by the court to turn over the tax roll for the year 1905 to the sheriff with the usual warrant for the collection of said taxes. The court then adjourned without day.

**Open Bids.**—On next Monday afternoon the Clatsop Mill Company will open bids submitted for the construction of the extension of its wharf. It is planned to build the wharf 163 feet long, and will reach the harbor line.

In addition to engaging in the lumber business, the corporation proposes to build a railroad from Deep River, in Wahkiakum county, Washington, to a point at or near South Bend, on Willapa Bay, in Pacific county, Washington. It also plans to operate steamboats and ferryboats on the Columbia in connection with the railroad. The capital stock is \$200,000, divided into 2000 shares of \$100 each. The principal place of business is Portland.
