NO HEIR TO THRONE

Dismissal of Prince Tuan's Son Leaves No Successor.

DOWAGER WILL SELECT ONE

Chinese Empress Orders All Eligible Princes in China to Present Themselves to Her—She Will Choose One For Future Emperor.

PEKIN, Jan. 24.—Since Prince Tuan's son was dismissed on account of his father's complicity in the Boxer disturbances, there has been no heir to the throne. The Dowager Empress therefore has ordered all eligible princes to be presented at the palace on the Chinese New Year and from these she will select three or four who will be kept in the palace for a year or two. From these princes the Empress' successor will be named.

The viceroys of the Southern provinces have expressed a desire to mobilize the troops for maneuvers in the spring. The government however, disapproves of such mobilization, fearing that an assemblage of the southern forces might result in anti-foreign demonstration. There has been much agitation recently looking to the reorganization and enlargement of the navy.

A Japanese naval attaché is coming to Peking and it is said that the Japanese hope he will be entrusted with the work of creating a new navy.

FUNERAL DRIVERS UNION.

New York Funeral Drivers Want Closed Shop.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Union funerals will be demanded in a few days by the Funeral Drivers' Union of New York and vicinity, which was organized yesterday as a local branch of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. There are 1500 such drivers in New York and vicinity and 1200 of them, it is claimed, are in the union.

Recognition of the union and of the closed shop in the driving of hearses and an advance of wages will be demanded by the undertakers.

ELECTROTYPOTHETAE FORMED.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—It is announced today that as a result of the open shop agitation among the employing electrotypers a new association of employers has been organized. This is called the Electrotypothetae and will take in the independent firms which are running open shops as well as the members of the Typothetae who have electrotyping plants.

PLOT IS DISCOVERED

Authorities Unearth Plot to Kill Prominent Men.

ITALIAN ANARCHISTS' WORK

In Hunting the Murderers of Wealthy Italian, Pennsylvania Officers Unearth Plot to Assassinate Leading Men of Country—Anarchists Are Arrested.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Jan. 24.—In hunting for the murderers of Michael Carranza, a wealthy Italian who was shot at Dunlevy last week, Washington county authorities have unearthed a plot to assassinate some of the leading men of the country. They have secured evidence that among those marked for death was Governor Pennypacker of Pennsylvania. Letters and papers are also in the hands of the authorities which decree the death of other leading men. The existence of this band of anarchists was unearthened when Coroner Schee and Chief of Police Logan, of Monongahela, began to follow up clues on which charges will be based, which were discovered in a squalid shanty near the mining village of Baird, three miles from Monongahela city. In this house, located in an obscure hollow, were found papers and documents pointing to a wholesale assassination scheme. Anarchists in many parts of the country are implicated and arrests in many sections are looked for.

John Spida, the alleged president of the society, has been arrested.

KAISER'S HUNTING LICENSE.

How One of the German Papers Settled a Discussion.

HAMBURG, Jan. 24.—When the German papers get "hard up for news" they are about as foolish as newspapers published in other portions of the world. For instance, there has been a heated discussion in the Germany papers recently as to whether the Kaiser is compelled to carry a shooting license. The point was ultimately settled by the newspapers Wild und Hund, which was enterprising enough to secure the actual text of the document that the other papers were discussing. It read as follows:

"Valid for one year. Twelve months' shooting license for his majesty, the Kaiser and king, living in Berlin. Good from December 1, 1905, till November, 1906. (Signed) Von Burries, Chief of Police, Berlin, November 17, 1904." A foot note says: "Fifteen shillings must be paid for this license." An interesting detail in connection with the discussion was found in the fact that the officials of the Kaiser's household had forgotten to have the old license renewed until the subject matter was brought to their attention by the controversy.

DO NOT LIKE GRAIN WHISKY.

New Zealand Authorities Say It Is Not Real "Booze."

SYDNEY, Jan. 24.—The customs authorities of New Zealand recently refused to take into bond a parcel of grain whisky on the ground that it was not whisky at all, but only a neutral spirit colored, and apparently this is the first action of the kind taken in New Zealand.

From Western Australia even more drastic action is reported. A leading official of the government has commenced the bitterest kind of a crusade against grain whisky, and has practically killed the sale of the well known blends because they are, as he contends, largely composed of grain spirit, colored and flavored. At the present time Australia and New Zealand import large quantities of whiskies and, together, they constitute one of the best markets for alcohol in the world.

RUNS AMUCK.

Insane Smuggler Tries to Kill Two Men At Esquimault.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 24.—William Jameson, an old-time smuggler, became insane last night and ran amuck with a shotgun. He attempted to kill Captain Gaudin, agent of marine at Esquimault and attacked the sentry at the British Naval dock yard. When he aimed a shot at the sentry the latter rushed at him. The insane man broke the gun over the sentry's head, wounding him seriously. The sentry rang the alarm bell and the dock yard force assembled, securing the maniac who chewed the sentry's hand severely before his capture was effected.

IMPROVED SURGERY

Internal Organs Removed and Subjected to X-ray.

SAID TO BE LATEST METHOD

At Roosevelt Hospital in New York Patient is Operated on—Kidney Removed and Subjected to X-Ray—Then Put Back in Body.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—An operation with an unusual feature was performed yesterday at Roosevelt Hospital. A patient had been suffering for some time with stone in the kidneys. The exact location of obstructions of this sort is some times determined by the X-Ray before the etherization of the patient. The surgeon in charge of the case decided to find the stone which was very small by putting the organ to the rays after which taking it out of the body. After having etherized the patient he was operated on and within a minute the surgeon had the kidney out as far as possible. He held it in his hand and with the fluoroscope found the small stone. A moment later the stone was removed and was inspected by the attending doctors. Within about seven minutes after the first stroke of the knife the kidney had been put back in place and the lips of the slit in the back sewn together. Fifteen minutes later the patient was back in his room. The same doctor said he did not see why the liver, or some other vital organs could not be examined in the same thoroughly manner. The operation seemed to him to prevege splendid possibilities in surgery.
