

MESSAGES FROM SEA

Perry Leaves for Scene of the Valencia Wreck.

HAMMOND RAFT SNUBBED UP

Aurelia and Alliance Get Away For San Francisco—Elmore May Leave Today—Senator Due In Morning—Kilburn Billed to Leave.

The revenue cutter Commodore Perry arrived here from Portland yesterday morning early, and had hardly come to an anchor before Captain Tuttle received orders to proceed to the scene of the Valencia wreck and do what he could toward saving life and property. The Perry got under way at 4 o'clock and must have reached the bar about the time the dense fog settled over the sea and bay. She will be pretty late for rendering very much assistance but, as the Missourian has it, "there's no telling the luck of a lousy calf," and she may do her share in the amelioration of one of the most heart-rending accidents on record.

Geographic Names.

The following decisions of the United States Board on Geographic Names were rendered January 3, 1906:

Alatna; river in northern Alaska, large branch of Koyukuk River from the northwest. (Not Ah-lash-ok, Alashuk, Al-lash-ok, Allatna, Allen, Allenkata, nor Oklashok.)

John; river in northern Alaska, tributary to Koyukuk River from the north near longitude 152 deg. (Not Alechikna, Ascheesna, Fickett, nor Totzenbetna.)

Ling; river connecting Upper and Lower Klamath lakes, Oregon. (Not Klamath.)

Storey; island in Prince William Sound, Alaska, just north of Naked

Island. (Not Little Naked nor Storey.) Storey; slough, one of the outlets of Copper River, Copper River delta, Alaska. (Not Storey.)

Wild; river in northern Alaska, a large affluent of Koyukuk River coming from the north near longitude 151 deg. 30 min. (Not Hokotena, Totzenbet, Totzenbetna, Totzenbetna, nor Totzenbetna.)

FLOTSAM AND JETSAM.

The steamship Senator is due at the O. R. & N. piers early tomorrow morning, on her way to the Bay City.

The steamer Aurelia arrived down from Portland yesterday morning, San Francisco bound, and left outward at once.

The steamer Jordan brought in yesterday, among other passengers, Mr. and Mrs. Gettis, and Miss Lamond, from Skamokawa.

The steamer F. A. Kilburn is due down from Portland this morning on her way to Eureka and San Francisco.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore is all ready for sea, but the sea is not just ready for her, or has not been, for a couple of days. She will try it out today.

The schooner sighted off the bar yesterday morning is believed by those well posted in the schooner fleet operating out of here, to be the three-masted schooner Alice McDonald, from San Pedro.

The French ship La Rochelle arrived for Queenstown, and Falmouth for orders, arrived in this harbor yesterday on the hawse of the Harvest Queen and will get dispatch for sea at the earliest available tide and bar, having cleared here.

The Hammond raft is checked up once more. It is moored hard and fast to a big nest of dolphins under the lee of the Flavel pier and has two anchors down at the outboard end, and

is in good water at low tide. It is hoped its peregrinations about the bay have ceased, for a while, at least.

The vacancy caused by the resignation of Chief Engineer George Q. Welldin, of the steamer Columbine, is yet to be filled. It is thought the appointment may fall to Chief Engineer O. F. Wilson, of the late, lamented "Manzanita."

The steamer Alliance came down from Portland yesterday morning, en route to Eureka and Coos Bay points. She took on several tons of freight at the Callender pier, and the following passengers registered out of here. Mrs. C. Erickson, for Eureka, G. Christensen, Eureka; L. D. Heater, Miss Gertrude Baxter, J. C. Pierce and W. E. Lynn, for Marshfield.

The steamer Lurline arrived at four o'clock yesterday afternoon and left up on time, at 7 p. m. Captain Larkin, her popular master, was taken ill on the way down, and relinquished his command on the up-trip to his first officer. He has not been feeling well for some time, and may lay off to recuperate. His Astoria friends all wish him a happy issue from whatever may ail him and that he will soon be all "O. K."

ECUADOR UPRISING

Revolution Rampant Throughout the Whole Country.

TROOPS ARE IN SYMPATHY

Former President Alfaro is at the Head of Revolution—Soldiers Desert to the Rebels and Government is in Severe Straits.

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 25.—The first day of the year 1906 was chosen by the followers of General Alfaro, the former president to raise the standard of revolution. The rebels intended rising in all the republic the same day, but their plans were discovered and partly failed.

The revolution commenced with an attack on the Rio Bamba barracks by Colonel Emilio Maria Toran, with several young Rio Bambanos.

Some of the soldiers of the Quito battalion whose barracks were attacked, were in sympathy with the rebels, and a severe fight took place within the barracks. Many were killed or wounded on both sides.

The rebels occupied Rio Bamba on January 4, when they were attacked by government forces from Guayaquil under Colonel Manuel Andrade.

Guaranda, capital of the province of Bolivar was next occupied by the rebels.

As soon as the news of the rebellion reached Quito, the capital, Colonel Thomas Larrea, secretary of war and the navy, left that place with two battalions and some pieces of artillery. These battalions later joined the rebels and Colonel Larrea returned to Quito with part of the artillery.

The news of this was concealed for four days. Meanwhile the authorities at Guayaquil sent the Sucre battalion of artillery under Colonel Manuel Andrade to attack the rebels. Beside the artillery the authorities sent to the front a force of policemen and a number of recruits. These forces under Andrade during the morning of January 4, attacked and defeated the rebels under Teran and who had abandoned Rio Bamba and occupied San Juan.

War Secretary Larrea whose troops were expected to take part in this action, was that morning returning to Quito, having joined the rebels with all his troops.

The rebels at Guaranda imprisoned the tax collector and obliged him to give them \$12,000. After the fighting at San Juan the rebels were reinforced by the troops which deserted from Colonel Larrea and the government troops under Andrade avoided a battle and retreated to Alausi.

Beside the calamity of the revolution yellow fever is spreading here. There are twenty-two cases at the government quarters at Lazareta.

MILL AND MILLMEN

Newsy Items From Columbia Valley Logging Camp.

MILLS STARTED AND CLOSED

Latest Reports From Nearby Plants—Building Remodeling and Extending, the Order of the Day—Data Entirely Authentic.

The following compendium of real late, live news of mills and millmen in this end of the Columbia river valley, will be read with very definite interest, especially when the authenticity of each item is known to be accurate and certain:

"The mill of the Westport Lumber Company was closed during the holidays for some much-needed repairs. An extension of thirty feet was added to the main building in order to give room for placing the trimmers in better position and otherwise facilitate the work on the main floor. A new log was also built that required the use of 28,000 feet of heavy timbers. A 30-amphere dynamo and an engine to drive it were also installed so that in the future the entire plant will be suitably lighter. The company has also just finished a large and commodious rooming house for accommodation of employees. The building is 30x100, two stories high and contains 48 well-lighted and furnished rooms. Other and more important additions will be made to the plant's equipment as fast as the work can be done."

The Westport people will soon begin the erection of a series of new dry kilns, for the purpose of enabling them to enter, upon advantageous terms, into the contest for Eastern trade under the rules of the "Czar" provisions, which demand that all lumber shipped East shall be thoroughly kiln-dried. President Palmer, of the Westport concern, will have the kilns built up

on a new and successful system, which involves the steaming of the lumber before it enters the kilns, thus securing the elimination of every particle of moisture.

The Pelton-Armstrong Logging Company which owns a logging railroad out of Cathlamet, will at once commence the construction of a new saw and shingle mill at Cathlamet, where its camp railway connects with the river service. The plant will be a small one for the present, employing about thirty hands, but will be expanded as the business shall warrant it.

The Benson Logging Company, of Clatskanie, which about two years ago, built a logging railway from the line of the Astoria & Columbia system, to its properties in the woods south of that place, and entered into a traffic arrangement with the A. & C. for an interchange of business with the town of Clatskanie, along with the company's hauling, has lately cancelled the contract, and the town now has to rely upon water transportation for its merchandise. The Benson people were forced to abandon the matter on account of its operations on the north shore. They claim it does not pay them to haul freight, and at present they are not operating their Clatskanie mills. The steamer Dixon and its tri-weekly service at Clatskanie, is the sole resource. The Keystone Lumber Company and the Summit Lumber Company have closed down on this account.

The Mount Hood Lumber Company, at Ingles, is about to increase its output by putting in a band mill at the plant where its planing mill is now. Its saw mill is four miles away and the rough goods are flumed down to the finishing mill. The pony band mill will be erected at the railway line, and the output of the upper saw mill will be flumed down in cants and sawed, planed and dressed at the point of export.

S. E. Wren, who recently purchased the Clatskanie Lumber Company's plant at Palmer Station on the A. & C. railway, is remodeling the mill, and equipping it with new machinery and boilers and generally rehabilitating the plant for a contemplated expansion of business.
