PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—Although shipments in dressed pork and veal have been unusually heavy on Front street for the past few days, so great is the demand that the market has been cleaned up at top quotations, and dealers are ready to handle all of these meats that they can get.

Eggs remain firm, with a tendency to decrease, however, the season has arrived when hens may be expected to commence laying. Big shipments will come in next week, which will send prices down several cents.

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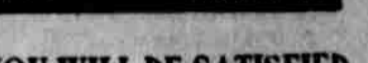
