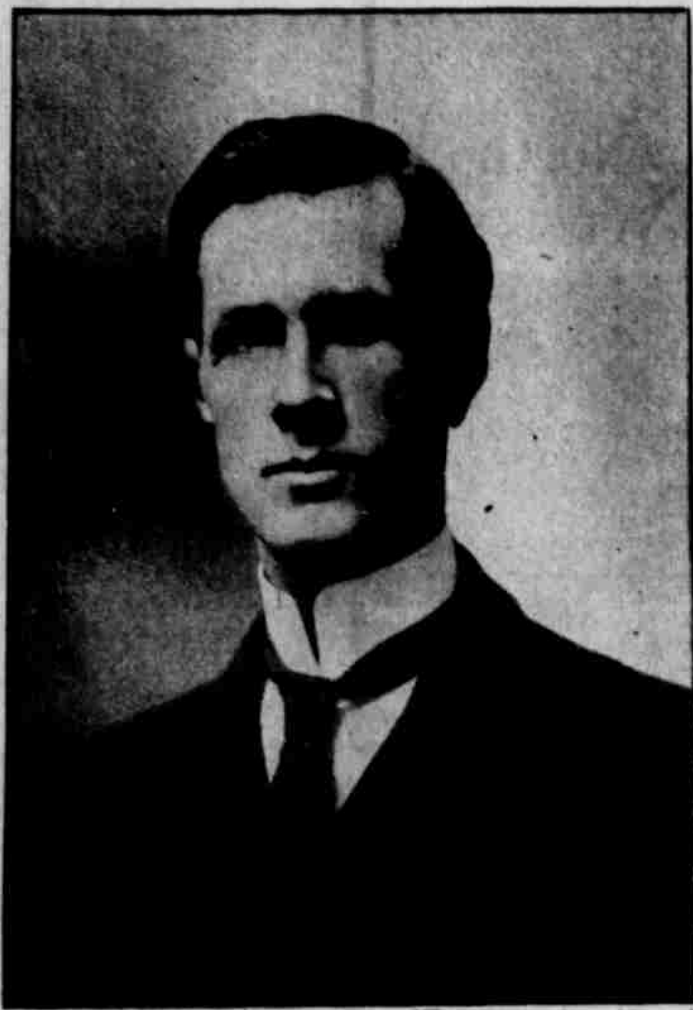

WILLIAM J. LACHNER.

William J. Lachner, of Baker City, Oregon, member of State Board of Tax Commissioners and Republican candidate for nomination for Representative in Congress for the Second Congressional District of Oregon has filed his petition for the nomination with the Secretary of State.

In his petition Mr. Lachner goes on record with the following promises to the voters of the Second District:

Faithfully represent the people and their interests;

Co-operative with President Roosevelt on his rate policy;

Urge a revision of the tariff;

Work for free-trade with the Philippine Islands;

Favor election of Senators by direct vote of the people; and

National control of corporations doing an interstate business;

Stand with the President for completion of Panama Canal;

Work for an open Columbia River to the largest ships afloat; and

Continued work on the Celilo Canal; Urge reclamation of arid lands;

Favor stringent Chinese exclusion laws;

Just and liberal treatment to deserving veterans; and

The parcels post for rural mail service.

Mr. Lachner directs that the twelve words allowed to be printed on the nominating ballot opposite his name shall be these:

"Roosevelt's rate policy; tariff revision; Chinese exclusion; free trade—Philippines; open Columbia."

For the purpose of securing signers on his petition as required by law, Mr. Lachner has placed a number of his petitions for signatures with the county clerk of this county.

### MORE COMFORT THAN EVER.

On Sunday, December 17th, the Denver & Rio Grande railroad will inaugurate a daily line of standard and tourist sleeping cars between Denver and Los Angeles in connection with the new Clark road. Both cars will leave Denver daily at 9:30 a. m., and arrive at Salt Lake City at 1:35 p. m., the next day. At this point the cars will be held over until midnight, thus allowing through passengers the privilege of a stop-over of ten hours and a half in Salt Lake City. Eastbound, these cars will leave Los Angeles at 8 p. m., and arrive at Salt Lake City at 6:30 a. m., second morning where they will remain over until 3:50 p. m., thence to Denver where they will arrive at 4:20 the following afternoon. This stop-over at Salt Lake City of the regular line of sleeping cars promises to be an attractive feature for transcontinental travelers.

### WILL INVESTIGATE.

Immigrant Wanted by Russian Secret Police For Political Reasons.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Unusual features in the arrest Wednesday of Felix Gadsis, at the request of the secret police of St. Petersburg when Gadsis was about to disembark from the steamer Moltke, caused an investigation today by the United States immigration authorities. It was reported to this department that the Russian was wanted for political reasons and that the charge that he embezzled 40,000 roubles which the secret police prefect cabled to the New York Police Commissioner was only a pretext to get him into custody. Yesterday he told Immigration Commissioner Watchorn that he was a butler in the family of a retired Russian general until two months ago when all the servants were discharged and the general's family left for France.

The immigration authorities believe that Gadsis is wanted as a witness against some Russian army officer and Commissioner Watchorn cabled to St. Petersburg for more facts about him.

### ADOPT RESOLUTIONS.

DENVER, Jan. 26.—According to a Republican special from Casper, Wyo., the Wyoming Wool Growers' Association has adopted resolutions protesting against the leasing of public lands, opposing any reduction in the tariff on wool, and hides, opposing the present charges for grazing stock and asks Congress to create an annual industry emergency fund to further aid that branch of the government service.

## EULOGIZE WHEELER

Major General Howard Pays Tribute to Character

HAD LIVED BEAUTIFUL LIFE

Was a Man Known and Loved in Every Part of the Country—Took a Great Interest in Children—Was an Earnest Christian.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Major-General Oliver O. Howard, U.S.A., retired, when he heard of General Wheeler's death, paid the following tribute to his old friend and one-time foe:

"I am deeply grieved to learn of the death of General Joseph Wheeler. He had led such a beautiful life since the Civil War, and had become much beloved in every section of the country. It was only a short time ago that he came all the way to Boston to speak for the boys and girls of the mountains and to help as much as he could the Lincoln Memorial University that we have tried to establish on firm foundations near Cumberland Gap. I was delighted at his sympathy and helpfulness. I had met him several times since his return to the army, once or twice at Tampa. I do not know of any man who showed greater pleasure in entering the United States service than he did in Tampa, when he put on again for the Spanish campaign, the old blue uniform of the United States. Once, when I was introducing him to a large audience at Carnegie hall, gathered in the interest of the Y. M. C. A. I remarked that he used to bother me more than any other commander that I knew of when I had a force in the West in 1864, and 1865. As soon as he could get on his feet he remarked with a pleasant smile that he wished General Howard would forget a little more of that ancient history.

"His marked characteristics were kindness, courtesy, the very beautiful ideal of gentility and the extraordinary devotion to duty as he saw it. His Christian sentiments were never obtruded upon strangers, but he was pronounced and outspoken as a Christian whenever the occasion demanded it. It was always a delight to meet him upon any topic connected with the public interests but more especially did he shine in private life."

When General Stewart I. Woodford rose to make an address at the dinner of the second panel of the sheriff's jury last night in Delmonico's word of the death of General Wheeler had not reached the diners, and one of the features of the function was the glowing eulogy passed on the ex-Confederate leader by General Woodford, who was his antagonist in the Civil War.

"Joe Wheeler is one of the best men you or I ever knew," said General Woodford, "and from the heart of this meeting goes out the fervent prayers, I am sure, that he may come back to us, or, if not, that he may rest on the other side as such a true and loyal man deserves."

A great cheer greeted General Woodford's remarks and at the suggestion of the toastmaster, William McElroy, General Wheeler's health was drunk.

J. P. Morgan and nearly all of the justices of the Supreme Court were guests at the dinner.

### STEAMERS COLLIDE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26.—The steamer Grace Dollar, bound for Seattle, ran into the British bark Pax, lying at anchor off Filmore street, late yesterday. Prompt action prevented possible loss of life. Both boats were badly damaged, the Grace Dollar being forced to put into port again for repairs.

### HOTEL BURNS.

Six Women Are Cremated on Top Floor by the Flames.

LOWELL, Mass., Jan. 27.—At least six persons lost their lives in a fire which partly destroyed the Richardson Hotel in this city early this morning. A large number of guests were in the hotel and those in the upper part of the building had little chance to escape by the stairways. The firemen at 2:30 o'clock found the bodies of six women on the top floor of the hotel.

### JEWISH LEAGUE FORMED.

Permanent Organization is Effected in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26.—Permanent organization has now been effected by the International Jewish League, formed in this city last month for the purpose of aiding Jewish communities in any part of the world in the attainment of civil and religious liberty. It is believed that within two months the whole Pacific Coast will be thoroughly organized. In time state leagues will be formed, and the heads of these state leagues will constitute the delegates from the national and subsequently the international executives will be organized.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 26.—John Segalos, the fireman who was rescued from the Valencia's raft says there were eighty-four people by actual count on the Valencia when he left on Wednesday morning.

## PROTEST OVERRULED

Imported French Rum Duty Not Reduced.

REFUSE IMPORTERS REQUEST

General Appraiser Decides That the Imported French Rum is Not Entitled to the Benefits of the Reciprocity Treaty With France.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—General Appraiser Hay yesterday rendered a decision on the French reciprocity treaty. It was based on the assessment of duty by the collector at San Francisco. The merchandise was rum, and was assessed for duty under paragraph 292 tariff of 1897 at \$2.25 per gallon. The importers claimed the merchandise was entitled to the benefits of the reciprocity treaty with France and therefore dutiable at \$1.75 per gallon under the provisions of section 3. The protests state that the rum was made in France from unmanufactured sugarcane from Martinique, a French possession. In previous decisions the board had held that brandy or other spirits imported from Martinique, a colony of France, are not entitled to the reduced rates of duty accorded to such merchandise produced in and exported from France by terms of the reciprocity treaty. In line with that decision the board overruled the protest.

On protest of J. Cusimano et al against duties assessed by the Collector at New Orleans on corn shocks, orange and lemon boxes, American goods returned, Judge Somerville decided while on the imports in question foreign goods were discriminately mixed with American, a fair proportion of the American shocks coming under the provisions of paragraph 295 would be represented by 50 per cent of each of the importations. To this extent accordingly the board sustained each of the protests, but half of the duty of 15 per cent should be paid.
