PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—Potato ship- pers all report a poor prospect for sales in California at present. A good many ears of Oregon are now on the side- tracks at San Francisco, but the inquiry for them is light. A small proportion of these potatoes is of fancy stock, and these are more in demand, but not at paying prices.

"There is no use of sending anything but strictly fancy stock to California now," said W. H. McCorquodale today, "and even these afford but a small margin of profit."

Another dealer said: "The 'Rivers' of California are of a superior quality this season, and compare favorably with inferior grades of this state. The latter are therefore at a discount, and considerable loss has already been sustained by dealers who paid good prices here and took chances on getting a small profit in shipping them South. One dealer alone has lost \$5000, and there are others whose losses are more than they care to make public. The outlook for better prices of potatoes is not very good at this time."

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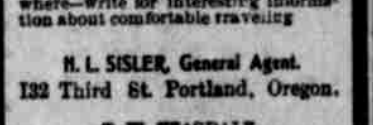
