# DEATH OF CENTENARIAN.

Mother of T. F. Kyle of This City Dies at Great Age.

T. F. Kyle of this city, has received word of the death of his aged mother n January 16, 1906, at Port Hope, Ontario, Canada, At the time of her death the deceased was 99 years, 9 months and 28 days old, having been born on March 18, 1806. The following account of the Centenarian's life taken from "The Evening Guide", published at Port Hope, Canada, may prove of interest to residents in this city:

"By the death of Mrs. Helen Kyle, the aged mother of Mrs. James Craiok, of this town, at an early hour Tuesday morning, a most interesting carver was brought to a close. Mrs. Kyle was born on March 18, 1806, in Dysart, Scotland. Her maiden name was Helen Findlay, her mother being a member of the famous Rudiman family. On her father's side she came from a family of seamen, who fought at various times in the great naval contests with the French. Her father, a naval officer, fought under Admiral Duncan at Camperdown. It is also interesting to note that her grandfather was out with Bonnie Prince Charlie in '45. Her brothers also had interesting careers as seafaring men.

"Upon her marriage to Thomas Kyle in 1827, she and her husband crossed to Canada. Mr. Kyle was an engineer, who was engaged in the construction of many
