PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—Fat cattle are coming in plentifully, and no advance in beef steers is looked for within 20 or 30 days, according to wholesale dealers in livestock.

"It costs at least 7 1/2 per cent to handle produce consigned to us," one firm reports, "and the only way we can save ourselves is to reduce the returns to the proper figure when sending checks to our shippers."

"At the same time, if we were to charge shippers 10 per cent for selling their stuff, they would quit sending us goods and would favor other firms which represent that they do business on a 5 per cent basis, but who really take the difference off when they send their checks to the shippers."

Smelt Are Plentiful.
Columbia River smelt are arriving freely and prices are down to a point that admits of little further reduction. The fish are scooped up into dip-nets by the boatload on the Cowlitz River, and are sent in 100-pound boxes by steamer daily.
