## DUE TO THE PEOPLE.

Two public affidavits have been put before the Astoria public within the last ten days, that mean nothing, or else they mean a great deal, to the tax-paying citizens of this city; the presumption being in favor of their radical importance as to popular concern. W. E. Goodin and W. J. Barry have uttered sworn statements that are significant of something very wrong in the handling of the street improvement department of the city, and either, or both, the documents invite the most riage, careful scrutiny from the heads of the city government.

It is easy to say that the gentlemen putting out these suggestive papers budget, are at logger-heads, that they have a personal quarrel pending, and that these attested declarations are but an expression of their enmity; this is met with the objection that men may say such things in the passing heat of passion, but rarely, or never, signify their animosity over sworn documents such as these, unless there is something very tangible at the bottom of the issues over which they are at variance.

Wathout saying anything as to the merits of the dispute between the two employes of the city, who have raised the unpleasant question, and with no conviction as to who is to blame for the conditions alleged to exist in the performance of the public contracts, it is quite in season and wholly expedient to say, that the entire matter is ripe for an investigation of every single charge contained in the two affidavits before the people. What of carelessness, what of neglect, what of downright wrong, is involved in the counterclaims of the men at issue, should be known fully, and quickly, in order that people with property waiting to be improved, may enter upon their work and expenditures with some fe-ling of safety and of adequate return for the money they may invest, as well for the vindication of the city officers who are now, tacitly, embroiled in the oproar. and amenable to sharp criticism for carelessness and favoritism, if for noth-

There have been quiet rumors floating over the city for months past of work improperly executed and plainly out of line with the specifications set up for the contractors, but they have been of the vague, unreliable sort that do not invite the serious attention of those interested, and have gone unchallenged.
