Oregon's hop crop for 1905 has been figured up carefully and found to be 112,000 bales. Up to January 1, 1906, 13e; fancy white, 14@15c. 77,311 bales were shipped out of the State, in aJnuary the amount was swelled by 12,910 bales by rail and 1280 by steamer. By February 14th, 3860 bales more were sent out. In the warehouses of the state there are now 16.805 bales stored, a large proportion of which has left the growers' hands, These figures show that there are only a few thousand bales now for sale by the growers. These are being taken up rapidly.
