JEALOUS HUSBAND

Shoots His Wife and Then Kills Himself.

QUARRELED WITH HIS WIFE

Man Was So Jealous That His Wife Left Him—He Then Procures Revolver and Kills Her and Himself.

OAKLAND, CAL., March 12.—Fired by

insane jealousy, which for more than a year had smoldered in his breast, causing numberless quarrels with his wife, Frank T. Homer, a painter, this afternoon shot and fatally wounded his wife, Mrs. Mary Homer, and then turned his weapon against himself, inflicting a wound from which he died this evening at the Receiving Hospital.

Homer's crime was committed in the presence of two of his children, Ruth and Dede Homer. Ruth, when her father fired the first shot at his wife, sprang to his side and tried to tear the revolver from his grasp, but he shook off the clinging hands of the child, and regardless of her screams, fired another shot at the woman and then shot himself in the head.

Homer's crime was committed after a long quarrel with his wife, who had left him a week ago, and was caused by her refusal to return to him.

WITNESSES MUST ANSWER.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—In an opinion by Justice McKenna, the Supreme Court of the United States today decided the cases against the witnesses in the "paper trust" cases, holding that they should answer questions propounded to them in the proceedings brought by the government against the alleged trust. The cases originated in Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Wisconsin cases were dismissed for want of jurisdiction, while in the Minnesota cases the verdict of the court for the District of Minnesota was affirmed.

GOES TO STANFORD.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. March 12.—Dr. A. A. Young, assistant professor of economics in the University of Wisconsin, has accepted the position of associate professor of economics in Stanford University, with the executive headship of the department. He will take up his work at Stanford with the beginning of the new year in September.

MAUDLIN SYMPATHY

New York Socialists Would Aid Idaho Murderers.

DENOUNCED IDAHO OFFICERS

New York Central Federated Union Will Protest Against Prosecution of Western Federation of Miners on Trial in Idaho.

NEW YORK, March 12.

John Chase, former Socialist mayor of Haverhill, Mass., got the floor at yesterday's meeting of the central Federated Union to ask for co-operation in demonstrating the Socialists are getting up to protest against the punishment of President Meyer, Secretary Haywood, and other officers of the Western Federation of Miners, arrested in connection with the assassination of former Governor Steunenberg of Idaho.

"If these two men are hanged," he said, "and if any man in this body or any other body is not then willing to shoulder a gun and fight for his class, he is a coward."

It was decided to send two delegates.

WOULD UNITE CHURCHES.

NEW YORK, March 12.—Rabbi Joseph Silverman said at a meeting of the New York State conference of religion held last night in the Universalists church of the Divine Paternity that he wished all the churches in the city could discard their different names and be numbered like public schools.

Dr. Silverman declared that the great religions, such as Christianity, Buddhism, Mohammedanism, and Judaism, were in essence one and the same thing and that the differences were those of nomenclature only.

His reason for suggesting that the churches discard their names was that in this way the people would forget to what denomination they belonged and the inter-denominational strife would be eliminated.

TO RELIEVE MINERS.

PARIS, March 12.—The Chamber of Deputies today unanimously voted \$100,000 for the relief of the victims of the Courrières disaster, and the mines' association has voted \$40,000 for the same purpose.

GAS WELL CAPPED.

CANEY, March 12.—The burning gas well was capped this afternoon and fire is now confined to the upright outlet of the hood. It can be shut off with valves as soon as the ground is fairly cooled with water.

The boat was in charge of Peter Vorside, with Nick Benovich and A. Johnson as helpers. All of the other boats of the fishing fleet that took out of this port arrived safely early in the evening.

NEW YORK, March 12.—Thomas H. Carter, Senator from Montana, last night gave a lecture in Brooklyn on "The Pioneers of the West" for the benefit of the Montanians of the Pioneers' Club. Senator Carter was one of the western pioneers and pathfinders and his lecture told of their trials, privations, and triumphs. He described what was within a few generations a wilderness.

WANTED HIS FOOT.

GRANT'S PASS, Ore., March 12.—Buda, the 10-year-old son of R. J. Colvin, was shot in the foot while out hunting with an older brother Saturday afternoon and was brought to the Grant's Pass hospital, where the surgeons amputated the foot at the ankle. The little chap was brave and begged them not to take his foot off.

The boys were out on the hill just back of town, and had sat down to rest. In getting up the gun was discharged in some way, the bullet taking effect in the foot of the younger boy.

HAS SEVERE VOYAGE

Steamer Philadelphia Is Struck By Huge Wave.

ENTIRE SHIP IS FLOODED

Monster Wave Suddenly Strikes Ship Flooding Officers' and Passengers' Quarters—Considerable Damage Done.

NEW YORK, March 12.

When the American line steamship Philadelphia sailed yesterday from Southampton the passengers reported that an other-wise uneventful voyage had been made excepting by a huge wave which without warning struck the vessel about eight o'clock on Friday evening last. Striking the stern of the officers' quarters the water flooded three quarters' length. After doing damage to the cabin crew's stateroom, the water descended to the dining room, the main deck, and then poured in, cascading down the well of the companion way to the main saloon. Passengers were flooded until the water was so deep that a force of stewards was called to wade in and get them out.

Men and women, stripped to their knees and playing while others ran out on deck to see what had happened. The great vessel trembled and quivered under the shock, and for fully five minutes almost a panic reigned on board.

So far as could be learned no one was hurt except one woman who was injured by being thrown against her berth.

Captain A. E. Mills stopped the engine and rode out the storm. Part of the steamship's bowsprit was carried away, iron railings were twisted and a large number of windows broken.

In addition the wireless telegraph instrument was put out of commission, the mast wires being carried away.

Captain Mills said that in all his experience he has never encountered a wave of such height. "It seemed," said he, "to pick the great vessel up like a toy shell, toss it into the air, and then catch it again, with practically little or no damage."

STALLION DIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—The well known stallion, "Seymour," died today from injuries received a fortnight ago when he was run into by a traction engine. Seymour Wilkes was a well known pacer on the California circuit and took a record of 2:05 1/2. He beat the famous Milwaukee at Agricultural Park, Los Angeles, in the race for all paces. Seymour Wilkes was one of the fastest sages of Guy Wilkes and had lately cured a number of promising light business horses. He was owned by G. W. Gregory of the St. George stable of this city, who valued him at \$10,000.
