SATO IS GRATEFUL

Secretary Japanese St. Petersburg Legation Thanks America.

FOR AIDING STARVING JAPS

Supplies Sent to Poverty Stricken Japanese Helped Some—Famine Was Caused by Heavy Rains Which Ruined Rice Crop.

CHICAGO, March 13. X. Sato, first secretary of the Japanese legation at St. Petersburg, stopped at Chicago yesterday on his way to Russia, where he will assume his official duties.

"We wish to express to the American people our gratitude for the generous contributions of money and supplies which have been so liberally contributed by them for the purpose of relieving the awful conditions which prevailed in Japan owing to the famine," said Mr. Sato. "The cause of the famine was the enormous quantity of rain which fell last season in the islands of Japan. The resulting floods ruined the rice crop and the people in many parts of the empire have died in large numbers for lack of food.

W. M. TOMPKINS OF TILLAMOOK IS DEAD

Pioneer of 1852 Well Known Throughout Oregon as Horsebreeder. Passes Away.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., March 13.—News reached this city this morning of the death of William Mason Tompkins, in Tillamook county, Sunday. Mr. Tompkins was a pioneer of 1852, and lived in the vicinity of Forest Grove from 1853 until seven years ago, when he moved to a farm near Tillamook City.

Born in Jerseyville, Ill., 1828, Mr. Tompkins spent his first winter in Oregon at the Dalles. While living in Washington county he became known all over the Northwest as an owner of fine-bred horses and of racers.

His widow, who lives on the farm near Tillamook, survives him, along with the following children: Mrs. George Bacon and Mrs. C. F. Miller of Forest Grove; Jesse R. Tompkins, of Gaston, Ore.; James W. Tompkins, who lives on the farm in Tillamook county, and Mrs. N. Myers of Tillamook City. The funeral will probably be held here tomorrow although wires are down west, and communication is difficult.

OFFICIALS DEFIED.

French Church People Resist Inventory Takers.

MARSEILLES, March 13.—An exciting scene occurred today at the doors of the cathedral. The local authorities attempted to take an inventory under the church and state separation law, whereupon the bishop, wearing his mitre, surrounded by the congregation chanting, ordered the authorities not to enter the cathedral. The bishop read a declaration denouncing the law as renewing the evils which brought on the revolution and the reign of terror. The bishop added: "Here, before the altar, I announce that I am prepared to suffer imprisonment, exile or death in defending the rights of the church."

The authorities withdrew in order to avoid trouble. The cathedral will be closed day and night, and guards who will keep regular watches have been organized to resist the government inspectors.

NO SNOW IN GILLIAM.

ARLINGTON, Ore., March 13.—The heavy wind brought freezing weather during the day as well as night in Gilliam, and the ground is frozen to a depth of two inches. There is no snow on the ground to protect the grain. The lambing season has begun with several of the sheepowners, and they are losing a great many of the lambs.

TRANSPORT WAITER SUICIDES.

HONOLULU, March 13.—E. Tattrell, a waiter on the United States Army transport Logan, committed suicide on March 8 by jumping overboard.

OPEN SHOP VICTORY.

Chicago Edison Electric Company Wins Their Fight.

CHICAGO, March 13.—Employers scored the first "Open shop" victory of the year against a labor union yesterday when 150 strikers returned to work for the Chicago Edison Company. The men who were employed on outside line work, walked out early in December, when the company refused to agree to employ only union electricians.

The Edison Company for years has employed union and non union men indiscriminately. The union, in an attempt to force "Closed shop" conditions in all departments of the big concern, called strikes on all buildings where non union men were working, interfering seriously with the completion of large building contracts in the downtown districts.

OPEN UP OKANOGAN LAKES.

Canadian Pacific Announces Extension of Crow's Nest Pass Line.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 13. It is announced here that the Canadian Railway Company contemplates extending the Crow's Nest Pass line westward from Midway to Pentstemon, opening up a country very rich in minerals and with great fruitgrowing possibilities.

This will complete another link in the direct line from Dunsmuir to Vancouver, which is believed to be ultimately contemplated. It will divert a great amount of tourists and freight traffic from Kootenai to the Okanagan country. The largest steamer on any inland water except the Great Lakes is now being built to run on the Okanagan lakes. It will contain 60 state rooms.

ILLEGALLY HELD.

Defense For Vincent St. John Makes This Assertion.

BOISE, March 13.—The habeas corpus in the case of Vincent St. John was heard by Judge Stewart of this county today. It was contended that St. John is illegally held as he has not waived his preliminary hearing that his case might be taken before the grand jury. It was further held that the warrant is fatally defective. The judge took the matter under advisement until tomorrow. It is stated an officer will arrive from Colorado tonight with requisition papers for St. John. It is not likely, however, the Colorado warrants will be served until the grand jury disposes of the Idaho case against him tomorrow afternoon.

COMMANDER MAY CHANGE.

VALLEJO, Cal., March 13.—Information has been received here to the effect that the cruiser Charleston has been ordered to the New York Navy Yard to be docked and cleaned preparatory to starting for this coast. In view of the need of repairs develops on her, the work will be completed in about ten days' time, at the expiration of which the cruiser will at once start on the long trip out from the Atlantic coast. She is to relieve the Chicago as flagship of the Pacific squadron, and it is expected that the latter vessel will go part of the way to meet her and that the flag of the commander-in-chief of the squadron will be transferred from one vessel to the other in midocean, as was done in the case of the Chicago and New York a couple of years ago, when the former came out here to relieve the New York, which had been ordered East.

LITTLE SNOW IN ALBANY.

ALBANY, Ore., March 13. The cold snap brought little snow in Albany, and many orchard owners fear damage to the trees. Flowers in the yards of many Albany homes are frozen, and many of the plants are ruined.

EXTRADITION FIGHT

Famous Physich Would Remain Safe in California.

WANTED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Mrs. Margaret Sauer, Now in Los Angeles, is Badly Wanted in Texas on Charge of Embezzling Thirty Thousand Dollars.

LOS ANGELES, March 13. Mrs. Margaret Sauer, alias Margaret Graham, the physich, who is vigorously resisting extradition to San Antonio, Texas, on a charge of having embezzled \$30,000, had a strenuous day in court yesterday. Judge James Overstreet the position on habeas corpus and she was at length mandated to the custody of the sheriff. The decision was sooner rendered than another writ was sought out by one of her numerous attorneys, on technical grounds, and the writ granted on immediate hearing.

The arguments proceeded and at the close of court the matter was taken under advisement. Mrs. Sauer is now under \$5,000 bonds.

LITTLE INTEREST IN ELECTIONS.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 13. The returns from the present elections generally show the selection of elders, priests and serbes to represent them at the district conventions, but there are notable instances of apathy for a complete election. At Avdatoff only 83 out of 1300 small farmers participated, and in the provinces along the Volga almost without exception the peasants continue to elect new men.

The full returns from the workmen's election at Moscow show that 65 per cent participated, and that they mostly selected moderate liberals.

THREAT OF AGRARIAN TROUBLES.

ROSTOFF ON THE DON, Russia. March 13.—With the advance of Spring there are symptoms of a reappearance of agrarian troubles in a number of places in St. Vrapol Province.

The peasants are refusing to plow the land for the proprietors, and indefinite reports from other provinces show that the peasants are hoarding and sowing the estates of the landowners. This is too early however, to determine how serious it will become.
