Professor Cavanaugh has a process by which milk may be purified and sterilized and reduced to a powder, from which it may be made into fluid milk again by the mere addition of water. So much may be saved in the transportation of the produce and in the saving of loss now incurred through spoiled fluid milk that the powder form should be reduced one-half in price and purity may be guaranteed.

The humanitarian value of the discovery is great, for pure milk at a reasonable rate is often beyond the poor in the big cities, especially in summer, and thousands of babies die victims to the impure product.—Ex.

LONDON, March 18.—The Drapers' Record, which generally contains the advance notices of certain fashions in a fairly authentic fashion, announces that the smartest spring hats will be covered with suede or chamois leather. DELIEVED HIM CRAZY.

Adams Known in Park City Where He Was Thought Demented.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 18.—A Tribune special from Park City says Steve Adams or Adam Stevens, held in connection with the Steunenberg murder is known here and is believed to be insane. While in Park City Adams entered a house and removed the furniture in broad daylight and in the presence of neighbors. He was arrested, but given a fine of but \$25 because it was believed his mind was unbalanced. While in jail at Park City Adams talked freely and said he had been in Cripple Creek during the trouble and it is alleged he said he was unfamiliar with the inside workings and was one of the three men chosen to assassinate the three supreme judges of Colorado, Governor Peabody and General Bell. He said he placed the revolvers in the Vin-dicator shaft that resulted in the death of McCormick and Beck.

INCITING THE PEOPLE.

LONDON, March 18. The Times-Shanghai correspondent says the native papers are using the same block and have published the picture of the Nanchang magistrate's head after his death, displaying the ghastly wounds. It was evidently a prearranged plan to stimulate the passions of the people against foreigners. The increasing hostility of the vernacular press is viewed complacently by the Chinese officials. The matter undoubtedly calls for diplomatic intervention.

SHOOTING AFFRAY.

PUEBLO, March 18.—A special from Florence says John Gehr, a former organizer of the United Mine Workers this evening shot John Thomas and his brother, Tom Thomas, and the latter will probably die. The affair occurred in a saloon where the trio were drinking. Gehr first shot John. The latter's brother scouted a gun and fired at Gehr, the latter shooting at the same time. The cause of the shooting is unknown. Officers are searching for Gehr.

SHIP IS INJURED.

PLYMOUTH, Eng., March 18.—With three members of her crew injured and the port bulwarks and part of the rigging carried away the British bark Don, from London, March 13th, for Vancouver, B. C., was towed into this port today. The Don collided yesterday off Starlight with an unknown vessel.

SNOW IN PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, March 18.—It snowed today to the depth of four inches but disappeared tonight under the influence of a mild wind. The present fall is the greatest ever recorded in March.

SUICIDE IS FOILED

Man Tries to Kill Himself But Fails.

CUTS THROAT IN ATTEMPT

While Riding in London Cab Man Slashes His Throat—Is Taken to Hospital and Saved in Spite of Struggles.

LONDON, March 18. It is difficult to see how much nearer death man can get than did Johannes Lebelvian, a Dutch sailor who has just been discharged from the London hospital. While riding on top of a Blackwell omnibus, he cut his throat. The driver, with scarce presence of mind, turned his horses and drove his vehicle full of passengers to the front door of the London hospital. The man gripped the rail, and some time was lost in removing him to the hospital. The large arteries were only grazed, but the wound was completely severed and the vocal cords were badly cut. An ambulance was out of the question and the man, who had lost a large amount of blood, was held down by three assistants while the surgeons sewed up his windpipe and the wound in the throat.

Lebelvian still seemed on self destruction bent and for a long time refused food. But in spite of all of these complications, he is recovering, and his return to Holland has just been arranged for by the Dutch consul in this city.

NOT AN AUTHENTIC SOURCE.

The positive statement of Judge Alton B. Parker of New York to the effect that President Roosevelt will ask the Republican National Convention of 1908 for another term in the White House cannot be accepted as authentic. In the face of repeated assertions by the President that he will not serve more than eight years in the chair of the chief executive, declarations by a former rival appear trivial, almost as trivial as other statements to the effect that the President may be the candidate of the Democratic party in 1908, as well as of a "radical" branch of the Republicans.—Butte Mountainer.
