What can the next legislature do to protect the state and at the same time save such boys from degradation and crime? The friends of child labor legislation and popular education may ask the next legislature to amend the existing laws in relation to the former subject so as to render compulsory attendance of school children between the ages of 14 and 16, provided they are without steady employment. Such a statute would give the boy of 14 the privilege of choosing between the alternative of school or work, but would keep him off the street, with its temptations and pitfalls.

**HAS FEWEST MISTAKES.**  
Woman Makes Record for Clean Work on Typewriter.

CHICAGO, March 20.—In the speed contests on typewriters at the National Business Show last evening, a woman made the record for the smallest number of mistakes in her copy. She was Miss Elizabeth Baker, and in half an hour she wrote 4085 words, making mistakes in only 52 of them. This was sufficient to place her in fourth place, the first prize being carried off by Charles H. McGurin, of Kalamazoo, Mich., who defended his title of champion "typist" of America by writing 4627 words in thirty minutes, an average of 154 words a minute.

H. Otis Blaisdell, of Chicago, won second place with a record of 4238 words. Third place went to Emil A. Treitzger of Peoria who last year won the championship of Illinois.

IT is the duty of the university to spread out the map of life and to show the journey. The man who is lost is still there, even in a wilderness. THE ONLY METHOD IS TO STEER FOR FIXED POINTS.

Dollars are not landmarks. THEY COME AND THEY GO. The thing for the university is to devote itself to teaching the lines of safety. We are as big as the things we have conquered. Our compass is the experience of knowledge.

There are two remarkable things about our race. First and foremost is the EXTRAORDINARY force in this country. The majority apparently have overwhelming compulsion. The university men entertain their own opinions.

The second is that of an accomplished fact. When one has done a thing or once a thing has been decided and you try to do differently, YOU ARE TOLD THAT IT IS NO USE TRYING TO REVERSE THE THING. If you were convinced that even the decision of the supreme court was unreasonable, would you say anything? No mistakes can be corrected if you believe in ACCOMPLISHED FACTS.

It is the duty of every man to READ THE PAST HISTORY OF THIS COUNTRY to have opinions of matters that have been decided and correct any mistakes that have been made. It is no small duty that lies before us. What do we intend to do? Must we not have some general scheme of life? Must we not always have the spirit of desiring the best—the truth?
