PORTLAND, March 26. Practically the only novelty in the local market today is a shipment of fancy ripe tomatoes and handsome Bell peppers from Cuba.

Three carloads of bananas arrived this morning from California. The fruit is all green and will not be ready for the market for three or four weeks.

The steamer Trench arrived this morning with a fresh shipment of cabbage and cauliflower, but it was in a badly damaged condition.
