

APPOINTS RECEIVER

Pennsylvania Paper Company's Mills Close Down.

WAS DUE TO BANK FAILURE

Free Land National Bank Fails and Compels Big Paper Mills to Close Down—Plant is Valued at About \$300,000.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 27.—Judge Archibald, in the United States Court at Scranton yesterday appointed James B. Watson, cashier of the People's Bank of Danville, receiver of the mills of the Pennsylvania Paper Company at Catawissa, Pa. The appointment of a receiver, grows out of the failure of the Free Land National Bank, that in litigation having advanced large sums to the paper company.

The Catawissa plant is one of the largest in the state and has cost in construction and equipment, about \$300,000. The receiver will complete the improvements now under way and operate the plant for the benefit of the

creditors. William D. Rockley, arrested on a charge of conspiracy in connection with the Free Land Bank failure, is secretary and treasurer of the Pennsylvania Paper Mills Company.
