PORTLAND, March 30.—Receipts of dressed calves have been so heavy the past few days that the price is considered weak, in spite of the fact that other fresh cuts are scarce and high. "It is not what we want for these calves that regulates the price," one commission man said, "but it is what the retail butchers are willing to pay." Even cabbage, of which the supply has been fair all winter, is conspicuous by its absence, and there is no telling when stocks may be replenished, according to dealers. Supplies are due from points adjacent to San Francisco Bay, but wet weather there has retarded picking. The same conditions prevail regarding cauliflower. Oranges are the only available green fruit to speak of, and the price has gone up to \$3.25@3.50 a box, with indications of a further advance as the season progresses.
