**Funeral Yesterday.**—The funeral of the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Lars Peterson occurred yesterday afternoon, interment at Greenwood. Rev. Gustaf E. Rydquist, pastor of the First Lutheran Church officiating.

**For the Long Term.**—E. B. Watson, of Portland, one of the distinguished jurists of Oregon, and ex-supreme judge of this state, is in the city, meeting old friends and new, in the matter of his candidacy for the popular nomination as United States Senator for the long term. He is a man of dignity and character and if he should be sent to the national senate would confer distinction upon the office and the state that sent him there.

**Touring the State.**—Hon. F. T. Wrightman, of Salem, is in the city looking after his interests as a nominee before the people for the office of Secretary of State. Mr. Wrightman has a good many warm friends in this part of Oregon, and he left here last evening on the Lurline with the pleasant conviction that Clatsop will be very kind to him on the 29th of this month. He is a young man of conspicuous ability, and has had enough experience in public life and affairs to make him a formidable candidate for the nomination and a successful officer if he shall be elected. At present he is in the service of the state, as corporation clerk in the office of Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar.

**Fire at Tongue Point Mills.**—Just before three o'clock yesterday afternoon, the employees of the big Tongue Point mills were startled into organic, fire-fighting action, by a signal announcing a fire in the dry kiln. The fire caught in the curtain that hangs down over one end of the department, and for a few moments it looked as though there was going to be some herculean work necessary, but the appliances and the perfect order maintained on the premises obviated any great loss. The company is at present engaged in installing an automatic sprinkler for fire purposes, and so much of the system as was in place was called into action yesterday with instant and remarkable success. There are twelve fire stations in the great establishment with a group of men to each station, each charged with certain separate lines of duty, and when each has accomplished the single task allotted to him the whole system of service is wrought, to the utter subjugation of the fire. There were about 50,000 feet of fine lumber in the kiln and this was pretty badly soaked with water and will have to undergo the full drying process again, and the spot where the fire got in its work may be put in order again at a nominal cost of \$75. The building is equipped with chemical hand grenades, and these "first aids," supplemented by the trained skill of the employees, puts the chance of a big fire pretty far away from reality.

**Dies Yesterday.**—Mrs. Annie Haugen of this city died yesterday morning at the St. Mary's hospital of senile exhaustion at the age of 86 years. The deceased was a native of Norway and had resided in Astoria for the past 26 years. Mrs. Haugen was twice married and leaves three sons, Olie Haugen and Iver Haugen of Astoria, and Louis Haugen of San Francisco. The interment will be in Greenwood cemetery.

**March Weather.**—The weather report for the month of March shows that the weather conditions were about the same as in any of the previous years, though the precipitation was less than usual, there being only 3.97 inches fall. The number of clear days were 10, and cloudy 14, and partly cloudy 7. The greatest precipitation for one day was on the 20th when .65 inches fell. The minimum temperature was on the 13th when the thermometer registered 25 degrees above, and the maximum temperature was attained on the eighth when 65 degrees was registered by the mercury.

**Award Contract.**—The contract for the construction of the new building of the Astoria Savings Bank was awarded yesterday afternoon to Ferguson & Huston. The building, which will be of pressed brick, will cost about \$40,000, and will occupy the southwest corner of Eleventh and Duane streets. The lower floor will be used by the bank while the second story will be designed for office quarters. The construction of the new building will be started in the near future and will be completed by the first of November.

**Quarterly Report.**—The receipts of the city auditor's office as taken from his report show that during the entire quarter ending March 31st the sum collected from sundry licenses amounted to \$2045.50 which exceeds the amount received last year by \$258.50. In January the fines and forfeitures amounted to \$585; in February \$700 and in March \$1035, making a total of \$2320 for the three months. Receipts for building permits for the quarter were \$18, and the amount from the City Cemetery for the same period was \$63. The total receipts from fines and forfeitures, building permits and the City Cemetery for the three months were \$2401.

**His Political Errand.**—Hon. A. M. Crawford, attorney-general of this state is in the city on business for the state, and while he is here, is interviewing his many friends on the probability of his renomination and election to the office he has filled so acceptably for the past four years. He is not confronted with any opposition that is likely to affect his candidacy or election, and it is conceded that he will be the next attorney-general without much doubt nor trouble. He has been very assiduous in the performance of his high duties and has given the weight and prestige of his deep learning to the functions of his office and the service of the people at all time and with marked success. He is careful and conservative, and his opinions have the invaluable stamp of wise and valuable conclusions and have stood the test of all subsequent criticism and analysis.

Before coming to The Telegram he was associate editor and manager of the San Jose (Cal.), Mercury.

**Distinguished Visitors.**—A. M. Crawford, attorney-general of the State of Oregon, is in the city, accompanied by State Engineer Lewis, both hailing from Salem. These gentlemen arrived here for the purpose of consulting Hon. Harrison Allen of this city in the matter of the important issues involved in the boundary dispute between the State of Washington and the State of Oregon, as to the exact meanders of the line that marks the north and south boundary between the two. The case is in full litigious shape and in the supreme court of the United States, complaint, answer and reply, and the preliminary steps are now underway toward securing the best and most applicable testimony. Numbers of well informed men hereabout are to be interviewed, including all the pilots and mariners familiar for long years with the lines and bearings and marks pertinent to this grave issue, and later on, this testimony will be reduced to writing and put in proper condition for presentation and discussion in the great tribunal at Washington. This state will be represented by Attorney-General Crawford, United States Senator C. W. Fulton and Hon. Harrison Allen, and the Evergreen commonwealth by Attorney-General John Atkinson and Assistant Attorney-General E. C. McDonald, and two other prominent attorneys of Seattle. The case will be heard in October, and it is hoped will be settled for good and all, and without detriment to either of the great contestants.
