

EMILIE MAKES PORT

Eleven Months En Route From Newcastle.

ARABIA LEAVES FOR CAINA

Barkentine Portland Arrives Down—Launch Pilot Under Repair—North Star Ready for Her Voyage.

Under the very fore-reach of the sou'easter, yesterday morning, the fine German ship Emilie, Captain H. Wilms on the bridge entered this port under the pilotage of Captain Anderson of the bar service and on the hawsers of the tug Wallula. The ship left New Scotland-Tyne, England, on the 15th of May, 1905, and is just 328 days out from her port of departure. She had fair weather until she reached the Horn latitudes when she ran into a series of gales that forced her to turn back when she had all but made the compass of Cape Horn, and run into Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, where she was laid up for repairs for a period of four months, lacking four days. She was battling off the Horn for thirty-five days, and lost her back-stays and her topsail yards and was compelled to seek port. Her master, Captain Wilms, is an accomplished navigator, and sailed his ship into Port Stanley on his own definite knowledge of the bar and harbor, and when he cast anchor there, his crew had to break away the ice from the chain and hawsers in order to free the holding tackle. The ship was a mass of ice for days and every line and coil of her gear was a solid mass of ice, and the ship herself had hundreds of tons of the deadly stuff clinging to her aloft and below. Happily no lives were lost in the long and obstinate fight with the elements, and she reported her full complement of twenty-seven yesterday, all in excellent health and spirits, and glad to be again in a snug harbor. The ship is of 1835 tons gross, and 1728 tons net, and is loaded to her capacity with a general cargo, destined for Portland. She went into Port Stanley on September 10th, and left there on the 6th of January, and had a reasonably fair trip to this port, but encountered one lively gale in which she sacrificed some of her lighter canvass. Captain Wilms is an old timer in this port and has no end of friends here and in Portland, all of whom will be glad to note the record of his safe arrival. The ship will go to Portland in due course.

 FLOTSAM AND JETSAM.

 The Alaska fisheries steamer North Star is all ready for her annual trip to the northern waters and looks as fit

as a yacht. She is in prime condition and snowy white in her new dress of paint. It is expected she will leave out on or about the 17th of this month or shortly after the big ships James Drummond and St. Nicholas have gone from port.

The steamship Columbia is due to arrive from San Francisco at an early hour this morning.

The motor schooner Gerald C. is due out for Nehalem as soon as the weather abates and she can get her cargo on board.

The steamer Alliance is due in at any moment from Eureka and Coos Bay points. She must have taken the brunt of the present storm.

The barkentine Portland has arrived down from Stella, lumber laden for San Pedro, and will get despatch as soon as the sou'easter abates.

The storm signals sent up yesterday were amply verified early in the day, and everything aloft hereabout laid snug to its mooring lines or anchor chains.

The steamship Roanoke is due to arrive in this port today from Los Angeles, San Francisco and Eureka, and will probably not show up until the night flood, as she has had to contend with the gale all the way up from Eureka.

Captain James Keating of the motor launch Pilot has that handy boat on the ways undergoing a general overhauling, and is doing his boating at present with the launch Ruby. When the Pilot returns to service she will be as good as new.

The fine Portland-Asiatic liner, the Arabia, arrived down at midnight on Saturday, and laid here until noon yesterday. Her second officer who was ill when she arrived in from China several weeks ago, is still incapacitated, and the Hamburg-Bremen Company had to send out a successor. He arrived yesterday on the noon express, direct from New York city and went on board his ship without delay. His name is Vogt. The ship tripped her anchor, and under the guidance of Captain Dan McVicker, left down and out in the face of the sou'easter.

EXHIBIT OF STAMPS

Rare Stamps Will Be Insured for Over Million.

LARGEST COLLECTION EVER

Specimens of Rarest and Most Valuable Stamps of All Countries Will Be Seen at Show in London In May.

LONDON, April 8.—The most important and comprehensive collection of stamps ever brought together will be on view at the international philatelic exhibition to be held toward the end of May at the Royal Horticultural society's hall.

"Stamp collections has made great strides of late years," said Mr. H. R. Oldfield, the secretary of the London Philatelic society, this week. Mr. Oldfield is organizing the exhibition, which will take place from May 23 until June 1, inclusive.

"The prices paid for individual stamps and collections have shown a great increase recently," continued Mr. Oldfield. "To show the value of the exhibits, I may say that I have already insured the stamps thus far promised for \$1,250,000 and before the opening day the amount of the insurance will total more than \$2,500,000. The prince of Wales and his son, who are enthusiastic collectors, are sending many rare specimens, and we hope to be able to induce the Prince of Wales to open the exhibition, the first of its kind ever held in London since 1897. Collectors from nearly every country are forwarding exhibits. Gold and silver medals will be awarded in the various sections. The exhibition will comprise British, colonial and foreign postage stamps, British telegraph, railway letter fee and college stamps. The album collections will each consist of from 5000 to 10,000 specimens. Young enthusiasts are to be given a chance and medals will be offered for competition among those from 16 to 21 years and also for those under 16.

MURDER A CORSICAN FAMILY.

Tragedy Occured While a Debt Was Being Paid.
 ROME, April 8.—A telegram from Corsica states that a family of five people have been murdered by the Mafia as the result of a law feud. The courts had ordered a man named Pola

to pay a debt within three days to a neighbor named Lenci. On the third day, Pola, accompanied by two men, went to Lenci's house and stated that he had brought the money with him. He asked that Lenci's family might be present as witnesses to the transaction and Lenci called in his sister and three daughters. As Lenci took a pen to sign the receipt for the money the three visitors raised their rifles and fired too volleys, killing the entire family on the spot. The murderers have been placed under arrest.

WASHINGTON-OREGON LINE.

What the Evergreen State Is Doing in the Big Question.

Attorney General Atkinson yesterday appointed Col. C. C. Dalton, of this city, as the commissioner selected by the State of Washington to take the testimony in the United States supreme court now pending to determine the boundary line between Washington and Oregon along the Columbia river. This suit was brought by the State of Washington, and yesterday Senator Piles, in Washington, D. C., filed an answer for the attorney general to Oregon's answer and the case is now in issue.

The complaint of the State of Washington alleges: "That a controversy has arisen and exists between the two states regarding the boundary lines between said states, and the plaintiff complains that the defendant has unlawfully claimed and exercised jurisdiction over numerous islands and sands in said Columbia river, when, as a matter of fact, all of said islands and sands are in truth, and in fact within the territorial limits and jurisdiction of the State of Washington and north of the boundary lines between said states."

The complaint goes on to relate that owing to the unsettled state of the boundary lines the peace of the people living in Pacific county, this state, has been seriously disturbed and that Oregon has at times forcibly carried away citizens of the state of Washington an alleged violation of fishing rights and other laws.

In discussing his appointment, Col. Dalton says:

"It will be necessary to take the testimony in this case in Portland, Salem and Astoria in the state of Oregon, and at Olympia, Cathlamet and Ilwaco in Washington. Assistant Attorney General E. C. McDonald of Spokane has been designated to conduct the case. The State of Oregon will also select a commissioner."

In an interview with 'The Times' correspondent at Olympia, Attorney General Atkinson said that he appointed Col. Dalton to the position owing to his familiarity with the subject at issue and his fitness for the place.

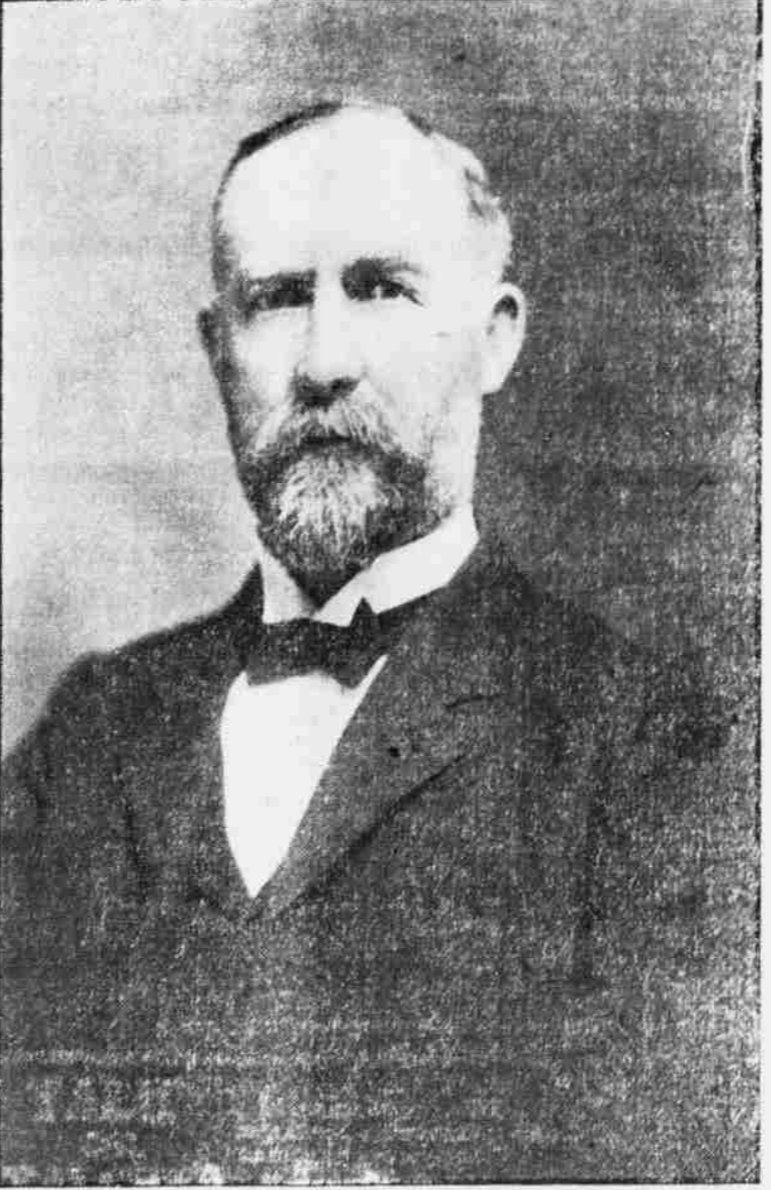
