

MUTINEERS WIN OUT

Portuguese Sailors Threaten to Sink the Ship.

ARE PROMISED IMMUNITY

Threaten to Blow up War Ship Unless Admiral Allows Them to Go Unpunished Which Is Granted.

LONDON, April 15.—The following details have been received of the mutiny on Wednesday on board the Portuguese flagship Don Carlos at Lisbon.

Two warrant officers, by threatening to fire on the mutineers saved the lieutenant from taking an involuntary bath, but the men insisted that he be put ashore, which was done.

The men showed him that they had possession of the magazine and that the guns were loaded. They threatened to bombard any warship that approached them and also to fire on the city if they were attacked.

Admiral Amaril also conferred with the men and promised them justice and freedom from arrest. Eventually the men yielded and 485 men of them went ashore. Their fate has not been reported.

A smaller mutiny has since occurred on the torpedo-boat destroyer Tejo. Naval officers say that their prestige is gone and that it would have been better to have sunk the Don Carlos than to have capitulated to the mutineers.

Astoria has already passed the 15,000 population mark and is going rapidly toward the 20,000 goal; if you don't believe it watch the newcomers upon the streets, which are crowded nightly, despite the fact that a large number of Astorians have gone to Alaska fishing grounds for the summer.

Contractor Gerding has several teams at work grading and clearing, and it is the intention of the park commissioners to also clear the little knoll for a band stand, so that the people may go out on Sundays and listen to music of the band and view the beautiful scenery.

The energetic chairman of the fire and water committee, Councilman G. W. Morton, will urge the addition of another hose company to be located somewhere near the O. R. & N. Company's dock; there isn't a fire company from the Occident Hotel corner, to Upper Astoria and Astoria with double the population of ten years ago, should certainly increase its fire protection, the cost of another hose company would be saved in the first five minutes of a fire.

Dan Moore and A. Duchamp, of this city are going to build an amusement pier at Seaside, from which those looking for recreation may fish to their hearts' content, without having to wander miles in search of rocks abutting into deep water.

Mr. Duchamp believes the pier will prove a great attraction for Seaside. It will be equipped with benches upon which the lovesick may rest, while seeking consolation in the never-ceasing murmur of the waves that roll in from the sea, and at high tide the pier will be far beyond the boiling breakers, giving those who care a chance to look down into the briny deep without having to suffer from the unpleasant motion of a vessel and safe from danger of shipwreck.

The pier will be built T-shaped, the "T" to be 25 feet wide and 80 feet long. A pile driver will be put to work in a few days, and the structure will be ready for business with the opening of the Seaside season.—Oregonian.
