through Smith's temple. Smith did not die instantly but lay groaning in a terrible manner, while the crowd of armed men, which had guarded the railroad track, came vaulting over the wire fence which enclosed the track of brush between the road bed and the river.

Mistake Is Feared.

For a few moments there was a feeling of anxiety on the part of Draper and the others immediately concerned with the shooting for despite the tell-tale blue cap which the dying man wore and his general description, there was a possibility that a terrible mistake had been made. These fears were quickly allayed by Detective Snow, who arrived in a few minutes, and positively identified the wounded and expiring man as Frank Smith, the criminal. Snow and Detective Resing had arrested Monday week for the robbery of the Troutdale postoffice, and the man who had daringly escaped hand over hand on a thin electric light wire from the Portland city jail.

Congratulations immediately followed and there was a gigantic cheer from the throats of the army of manhunters. Meanwhile, Smith, with a jagged hole in his temple, was breathing heavily. "Put another bullet into him and put him out of his misery," said a posse-man. "No," cried another. "He had no mercy on others, so let him suffer."

Dragged From Brush.

The outlaw was dragged from the brush to the railroad track and laid on a handcar. A dozen men pushed the car the quarter-mile to New Era. Smith groaned the entire distance and had not died when the posse began wiring for transportation home.

When a search was made of Smith, his revolver was found plugged with cotton. The weapon was clean, and in one pocket the desperado had 16 cartridges for his 41-calibre revolver, with which he snuffed out the life of Patrolman Hanlon, of Oregon City; Sheriff Shaver, of Clackamas County, and Captain Henderson of Woodburn.

Willing to Surrender.

There are some who contended that Smith's plugged gun indicated that he was willing to surrender, and that he hoped to be taken alive and was trying to hand his weapon to Draper when the latter shot him. Against this is the argument that the men who lined the track and covered every outlet of escape had repeatedly called Smith to come out and they would give him a chance.

An Ideal Trap.

A better place to trap the outlaw could not have been designed. A short quarter-mile south of the little hamlet of New Era there is a thicket of willows, cottonwood and a few fir trees, between the railroad and the Willamette River. This enclosure extends for about half a mile, and is about 900 feet broad at its widest part. Owing to its position a get away was impossible. The railroad track was guarded on the east, New Era was on the north, the river was on the west and the the south were guards.

STRIKE IS DECLARED.

DULUTH, Minn., May 1.—The great Lakes' marine strike was officially inaugurated at the head of the lakes at midnight.

Orders were received from President Keefe of the Longshoremen's Union, calling them out. The tug men, however, were not notified and they were working as usual. William Jones, of the Lake Firemen's Association last night received a telegram from President Keefe calling upon all members to quit work at midnight.

It is possible however, that this does not affect boats belonging to the Lumber Carriers' Association, men employed on the boats carrying mails or men who have signed papers for round trips.

The men on boats subject to strike orders are union mates, firemen and others.

FINDS GOLD IN CHAIN.

SHERIDAN, Mont., May 1.—Herman Herm-meyer, a son of the fatherland claims to have stumbled on an easy way of gathering gold. He has an old fashioned chain pump in his well, and a short time ago he discovered glistening particles of gold dust clinging to the chain. Investigation brought out the fact that the whole length of the chain, about 100 feet, had been filled with small holes by the action of alkali, and these holes, says Mr. Herm-meyer, were full of pure gold. He dug out the contents of several holes

If his cleanup pans out as hoped he proposes to lease all the wells in Sheridan and put in chain pumps.

ISLAND IN BOLINOS BAY.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—Professor E. Knowlton has just returned from a 30-mile walk to Bolinas Bay where, he says, there is evidence that the recent earthquake had its center.

In the immediate vicinity are the towns of Pescadero, Half Moon Bay and La Honda, whose inhabitants are nearly all Portuguese, who were among the first settlers of California.

Few, if any, of the houses in that vicinity, escaped damage, but no fatalities occurred.

There is now an island in Bolinas Bay, where there were formerly muddy shoals and on either side of the island the water is 70 feet deep.
