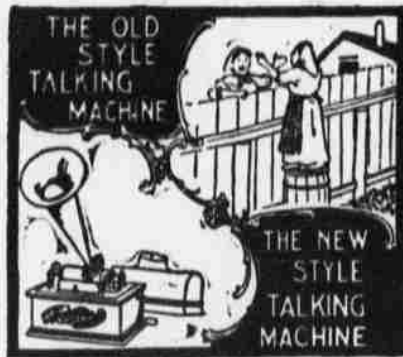

Distinguished Visitors.—Hon. J. L. Riseland, fish warden of the State of Washington, accompanied by his deputy, Lind Burton, and Senator John Welch, of South Bend, arrived in the city yesterday morning, and were here for a few hours. The warden is on a general tour of inspection of the hatcheries and fisheries of his jurisdiction, and incidentally is examining the locations, gear, and projected wheels, traps and other impediments of the craft throughout the Columbia River country. In course of a brief talk with a representative of the Astorian the Washington warden declared that he believed the poor run of salmon in these waters was not so bad a factor in the season's account as some held it to be, and that the access of fine fish in the late summer and fall, would far more than compensate for the shortage now complained of. He was very cheerful in the premise, and left on the state launch Nola for the Seaborg canneries on the northshore, with Deputy Burton and Mr. Ballagh, of Cathlamet. Senator Welch went home to South Bend, via Ilwaco.
