

NUMANTIA IN PORT

Big Chi a Liner Bucks Averse Winds for Days.

ALLIANCE AND HER PEOPLE

Oil Barge to be Launched at Knappton This Week—Movements of Coastwise Steamers—Schooners Jewett and Mahoney Arrive

The steamer Alliance arrived down from the metropolis early yesterday morning with seventy-four people on board bound for Coos Bay points and Eureka. Of these thirty were from Portland, and twenty from Salem, delegates to the Farmers' and Shippers' Congress now underway at Marsfield, and among the notables promenading her decks were noticed the following: H. L. Pittock, of the Oregonian; F. W. Leadbetter, Hon. Frank C. Baker, Hon. Jefferson Meyers, Dr. B. C. Coffey, G. M. Brown, A. P. Tift, C. M. Hyskell, J. E. Davis, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Evans, W. G. MacRae, E. Eysell, J. A. McKinnon, G. M. Cornwall, and W. L. Herand, from Portland. Salem's delegation was led by Hon. Ernest Hofer, president of the Willamette Valley Development League, under the auspices of which the meeting at Marshfield is held; and the following well known people were giving him support and encouragement of various kinds, namely, Mac. Hofer, his eldest son; Hon. M. J. Jones, C. F. Lansing, E. M. Callender, F. W. Spencer, Frank W. Derby, president of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, Col. L. K. Page, J. R. Rogers, J. L. Stockton, O. C. Kinney, F. G. Deckbach, J. A. Simpson, J. O. Beardsley, and County Judge John H. Scott, of Marion county. The party was saved from the onus of stagnation by the presence of Mesdames J. L. Stockton and W. T. Mott, of the Capitol City. The outfit waxed whiter and whiter as the miles lessened in the approach to the great bar; and we look for disastrous returns when the news of their contact with the crest of the barrier is at hand. The following passengers went south from Astoria, on the Alliance: R. J. Robinson, R. Norton, A. Ancen, Mr. and Mrs. N. Sauvez, Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Flink, E. Johnson and W. E. Remington.

The long looked for liner from China, the Numantia, was heard from North Head at high noon yesterday, and at 1:40 o'clock she was headed in over the Columbia bar. There has been no especial anxiety felt for the big ship, but for her to be five days and ten hours behind time, is so unusual a circumstance that it gave ground for all manner of talk here. She reports that the first eight days of her voyage were entirely favorable, and from that hour until she was sighted here, she was struggling against uninterrupted head winds. All hands are well, and she has an immense load of general stuff in her holds. She came up later in the afternoon and anchored in the city channel, and proceeded to Portland on the night flood.

The Simpson Lumber Company, at the Knappton mills, opposite this city are about to complete a big oil barge of 75,000 gallons capacity. The tank is sturdily built, and 26 feet by 80 feet in dimensions, and will be launched on Wednesday or Thursday of this

week. She will be employed about the bay and river, for the transportation of oil, for use in the logging camps and the canneries, that use the stuff for fuel in their engines, and for other purposes.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore left out yesterday morning at 5 o'clock for Tillamook City and bay points.

The steamer Redondo went to sea and San Francisco, at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning.

The steamship Costa Rica is due to arrive here from San Francisco sometime today, and perhaps not until the night tide shall set in shore, but she is on her way, all right.

The steamship Breakwater is due down from Portland this morning en route to the Bay City.

The steamer Lurline went up last night with a good bunch of people and lots of way freight.

The steamer Telegraph is keeping her schedule like a railway train these days, and doing a bit of business as well.

The schooner Andy Mahoney arrived in from San Francisco, and came up to an anchorage in the city channel.

The schooner W. F. Jewett came in from Redondo last evening and is anchored off the Flavel pier. She goes to Portland for lumber.

The steamer Roanoke arrived in last evening from San Francisco with a full passenger list and after remaining here for an hour proceeded on up the river to Portland.

PRINCE COMING.

NEW YORK, May 21.—The Herald today says:

Foreign advices state that Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany will attend the German-American races off Marblehead next September, whether the boat he is building to contest for the right to represent Germany wins in the trial races at Kiel in July or not.

The Prince is keenly interested in the racing of small boats and his attendance at the German-American races is another evidence of the Kaiser's temper toward yachting and the German-American entente cordiale in the sport. It is not yet known if the Prince will sail his boat, Angela II, himself or give the tiller to another Kiel yachtsman.

COUNCIL MEETING

Telephone Franchise Not Granted Last Night.

STREETS ARE DISCUSSED

Council Fails to Pass Telephone Ordinance Because Robinson Objects to Any Undue Haste—Other Important Matters.

Councilman Robinson blocked the passage of the automatic telephone ordinance last night, when he objected to the suspension of the rules for the third reading and the final passage of the bill. This was not according to program, but it had to go, and now the bill will wait until June 5th, before the question of its passage will again be brought up.

Councilman Logan moved that the rules be suspended and that the ordinance be placed on its final passage, at the conclusion of the first and second reading, giving as a reason, that the company should be granted the franchise as soon as possible so that work might be immediately begun to take advantage of the good weather. His motion was seconded and on the roll-call Robinson spoiled it all by objecting. The Pacific States Telephone Company had earlier in the evening presented a communication protesting against the granting of another telephone franchise, and a representative of the company was in attendance; though whether this had anything to do with the temporary blocking of proceedings is not known.

The communication of the Pacific States Telephone Company protested saying that two kinds of phones in a city, would be productive of great harm, and cited instances at considerable length. The communication was ordered filed. The ordinance as drawn provides that the Automatic Telephone Company shall be granted a franchise for a period of thirty-five years, with the provision that the city can take over the entire system after a period of five years has elapsed. The city is to be given the free use of twenty phones, and will be allowed to use the company's poles for fire alarm boxes. The price to be charged by the new company is fixed at \$2.75 per month for business houses and \$1.75 a month for private residences; provided that for every 1000 increase in subscribers above 1500 the company shall be allowed to raise the price to \$6.00 a year for business houses and \$3.00 a year for residences. A 25 cents discount will be given to subscribers paying before the tenth of the month. Work is to be commenced by the company within three months after the granting of the franchise by the city. The company further agrees to purchase a building and lot for its headquarters at a cost not less than \$15,000 within one year from the granting of the franchise. The ordinance will doubtless pass at the next meeting, unless something unforeseen transpires in the meantime.

The ordinance requiring junk dealers to pay a license, came up for its final passage and Robinson following up his obstructive tactics moved to indefinitely postpone the bill. Hansen objected, and the bill was voted on, and passed unanimously, even Robinson voting aye.

A petition to improve Exchange street from Twelfth to Thirteenth and another to improve Seventh from Grande to Harrison by putting in sidewalks, the work to be done at the adjacent property owners' expense, was granted.

A petition to construct a bulkhead along the west line of the sidewalk on the west side of Seventh street from Niagara south to Bay avenue, was referred to the street committee.

A petition to improve Eighth street from Lexington to the center of Niagara and Niagara from the center of Seventh to Eighth street by gravel was referred to the city attorney with instructions to draw up suitable resolutions for the improvement.

A communication was read from George Marsh and referred to the street committee, calling attention to the present unsanitary condition of the sewer through lots 10 and 11 in block 2, Shively's Astoria.

Prael-Eigner Transfer Company presented a communication proposing that the city buy a suitable patrol wagon and harness, and that that company furnish the horse. This was referred to the street committee.

The committee on public property reported on the matter of a janitor for the city hall, which was called to their attention by the water commission. Councilman Naboth made a verbal report which was adopted instructing the city auditor to inform the commission

to hire the widow which had been applying so long for the position of janitress of the water commission's office. It seemed to be the committee on public property's opinion that one janitor would not be able to do the work for the entire building; that the present janitor was already overworked.

Building permits were granted to John Johnson, J. A. Fulton, and J. C. Utzinger. The following bills were reported on and allowed: Jacob Butts, \$2; Foard & Stokes, 55 cents; Reliance Electrical Works, \$9.25; Fisher Bros., \$6.65.

The street committee reporting favorably on the following bills, they were ordered paid: John Cornwall, \$1.75; Prael-Eigner Transfer Co., \$12.

The committee on fire and water reported favorably on the following bills which were allowed: Hoge & Swift, \$3; A. V. Allen, \$2.65; C. E. Linton, \$5.75; S. Elmore & Co., \$15; Sherman Transfer Co., \$1.50; C. W. Holmer, \$16; Foard & Stokes, \$2.70.

The committee on ways and means reported favorably on the following bills which were ordered paid: Olof Anderson, \$1; J. N. Griffin, \$2.75; Svensen, \$1.70.

The committee on health and police reported favorably on the following bills which were ordered paid: Eigner Transfer Company, \$1.50; Sherman Transfer Company, \$2.00; T. E. Laurin, \$2.25. Liquor licenses were granted to Lee Herrin, Mat Sandsarom.

A communication was received from the street superintendent recommending the improvement of the following streets, which communication was referred to the city surveyor to make the proper plans for the said improvements: Bond street from Ninth to Fourteenth; Commercial street from Ninth to Fourteenth; Exchange street from Eleventh to Twelfth; three blocks on Eighth st., Bond street from Forty-second to Forty-fourth, and the Adair drain.

The city surveyor reported that the cost of raising the grade of fifth street from Grand to Harrison would be about \$900, and for raising the grade on Harrison from fifth to fourth about \$500. The city attorney was instructed to prepare a resolution to have these grades established.

The street committee reported on the various bids for the different street improvements, and their recommendations as to whom the awards should be given were approved.

An ordinance to improve Eleventh st. from Harrison to Kensington avenues was passed on the suspension of the rules.

The ordinance to reestablish the grade on Irving avenue from Ninth to Fourteenth street was read the first and second time and passed on the suspension of the rules.

An ordinance to improve Bond street from Ninth to Sixth streets was passed on the suspension of the rules.

The ordinance to license bookagent and those who solicit pupils for musical education, caused considerable discussion, and was finally laid over until the next meeting. Councilman Hansen thought \$25 a week was none too much to charge outsiders for operating in this city, while Stangland believed \$10 was enough.

A new fire station will be established on the O. R. & N. Company's property near the dock. The railroad offers to let the city have the property to use for this purpose for a period of ten years at a normal rental, the city to erect its own building on the property. This period was thought too short and the council will endeavor to secure the property for a longer time than ten years before going ahead.

Property owners on Kensington avenue are desirous of securing a street into that section, and the city attorney will draw up an ordinance looking toward accomplishing this. The street will probably be made twenty-five feet wide which is sufficient for the present needs.

The city engineer was given permission to employ an assistant for a month or longer if needed, to help him in his work, which has become rather heavy of late.

The council adjourned to June 5th.

NEW YORK, May 21.—A committee headed by Joseph H. Choate has been formed to erect bronze tablets on the buildings in this city in which William Lloyd Garrison and Henry George died. The committee has limited the maximum amount of a single subscription to \$10.

The house in which Garrison died on May 24, 1879, is still standing on the southeast corner of Seventeenth street and Fourth avenue. Henry George died on October 29, 1897, in the Union Square Hotel, which was his headquarters during his last campaign for the mayoralty.
