PORTLAND, June 1.—Poultry was in heavy supply and in the clean-up yesterday as low as 11 cents was named by dealers as best. Young ducks are also coming in very freely and price has dropped off.

Butter and Eggs. Among produce dealers the advance of city creamery to 24 cents was made by the house announcing the rise on account of the increased manufacture of ice cream.

Other grades of butter, so far, have not been affected by the advance, and there are no indications that they will be very soon.

Eggs at 19 to 19½ cents find quite an active demand and receipts, while heavy, are not top heavy.

Poultry. The tone of the poultry market is decidedly weak. Nearly every dealer talks lower prices, and the prospect is for continued low receipts.
