Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

PORTLAND, June 4.—There was no change in the sugar situation this morning except that wholesalers who had announced the advance made by the California Hawaiian Company and filled orders on that basis, have withdrawn the advance and passed a credit to purchasers booked at the rise.

Just which of the rival companies will "abandon the works" is not known today, though the wholesale trade express the opinion that under conditions and according to precedent the price is low and will stand the advance. Jobbers are said to be rather heavily stocked up, probably in anticipation of a rise, and unless another unexpected move is made by one or the other big refinery, the wholesalers are in good shape to handle their trade for some days.

The failure of the Western people to meet the advance by the Hawaiian does not lend any weight to the idea that an understanding exists between them as to setting prices. Something may turn up almost any day to put an entirely new face on the situation, and in the meantime jobbers and retailers have another guess coming.

Poultry.

The tone of the poultry market is decidedly weak. Nearly every dealer talks lower prices, and the prospect is for continued full receipts. No change in quotations is noted this morning, but another day may bring lower figures.
