PORTLAND, June 12.—Oregon-grown small fruits are beginning to make a creditable showing in recent arrivals...

This morning there were some nice Royal Anne cherries received by a leading commission house from The Dalles.

Concerning the California fruit condition the following advices have been received in a recently dated letter from Newcastle:

"It seems a certainty that disturbing features, heretofore existing, are to become permanently settled. Weather is clear, with warmth of summer, all indications being of a most encouraging character."

"Peaches—Alexanders now ripening rapidly, and sufficiently plentiful to load cars, which will be moving soon."

"Cherries—Much damage was done, particularly affecting Black Oregon, the result being receipts of that variety will be limited. Royal Annes are more plentiful, but the season will be short."

"Plums—Only the Clyman variety obtainable, which can be had in liberal lots."

"Apricots—Almost a failure in California. Cars will continue an average quantity, and for express trade, a good supply for a short period."

"Logan and Phenomenal Berries—Season will be short."
