PORTLAND, June 15.—The conference between the manufacturers of salt in the Bay district of California, referred to in these columns last week, resulted in an agreement through which an advance of \$1 per ton is announced. This advance does not affect sack grades at present.

An advance of 10c per barrel for cornmeal is given out today, making the quotation \$2.40 per barrel. Farmers seem to be holding back the grain for some inexplicable reason—that is, to dealers—which has caused a scarcity of milling maize.

Spider candies have been out of the market for about two weeks, but a carload received yesterday brought them again in stock.

Fried-on-top syrup is down 5c on 10-case lots.

Soft-shell walnuts are very scarce, and price has advanced 1½c, making quotation today 17c per pound.

GREEKIAN-ROMANIAN RUPTURE.

ATHENS, June 15.—Foreign Minister

Skouzes explained in the Chamber of

Deputies yesterday, the failure of

Greece's efforts to avoid a rupture with

Roumania which government had de-

clined the Russian proposal to negotiate

the controversy at St. Petersburg or

submit the matter to The Hague tri-

bunal for arbitration and had presented

proposals that were absolutely unac-

ceptable. Then came the demonstration

against the Greek legation at Bucharest

and the insult to the consul-general and

a Greek priest, for which Roumania not

only refused satisfaction, but passed

severe fiscal measures against Greece.

In the face of this unjustifiable attitude

the foreign minister said the govern-

ment decided to break off relations. The

chamber adopted a motion approving

the government's declarations.
