

WATERFRONT ITEMS SHIRIFF GETS FEES

The Injured Stanford Alongside the Brablock.

Gan Collect Money for Commissions and Expenses.

TELEGRAPH DOWNS SPENCER

JUDGE'S DECISION REVERSED

Believed the Steamer in Collision With Stanford Was the J. B. Stetson From Gray's Harbor—News of the Day on the Docks

George Gould Must Pay the Sheriff For His Services Rendered in Big Suit to Recover \$466,000 On An Alleged Contract.

At the request of the owners of the barkentine Jane L. Stanford, now present in this city, the following gentlemen consented on Thursday last to act as a board of survey to estimate the damage wrought upon the barkentine Jane L. Stanford in her recent midnight collision at sea, off the Columbia bar, with an unknown steamer. P. L. Cherry and Captains Crowe and Martin, and survey was mitted. It does not touch upon the nature of the accident nor the responsibility therefore, but fixes the sum of damage in the neighborhood of \$5000, the principal items of injury to the ship being impairment of stem, injury of bowsprit, foremast, fore-top-gallant-mast, main-top, lower fore-top-sail yard, fore-royal and sky-sail yards, and nearly all the gear on the fore and main, to be renewed and the head sails and other canvass replaced. There are a number of rumors out as to the identity of the vessel that was in collision with the Stanford, but there is nothing of substance in any of the deductions, but the next few days should bring to light the real cause of the trouble, and the no-doubt co-sufferer with the Stanford.

Captain E. A. Smith of San Francisco, one of the principal owners of the Jane L. Stanford, and now in this city, is of the opinion that the steamer in question was the J. B. Stetson, which sailed from Gray's Harbor on Tuesday, lumber laden, for San Francisco, and which should have been about in the locality of the collision at the time of its occurrence, and says that the Merchants' Exchange of San Francisco, with which he has been in constant intercourse by wire for the past thirty hours, holds to this view, a matter, of course, which can only be settled upon the arrival of the Stetson at that port.

The steamer Telegraph men claim that the steamer Charles R. Spencer yielded the palm for speed to the former vessel yesterday morning coming out of Portland. The Telegraph lined up and waited for the Spencer to take her position for a spurt down the lower Willamette, but the Spencer reneged, and hung back, until the Telegraph had to get underway in defense of her schedule. It is generally conceded on the river now that the Telegraph is the fastest thing afloat in these waters. She went back to Portland with sixteen people on her register.

The following vessels are berthed at the Knappton docks loading lumber from the Simpson mills: The four-masted schooner Alumna, for San Francisco, the barkentine Echo, for Australia, the barkentine Chehalis, will soon be due from Honolulu, to load from there for San Francisco delivery, and the Italian ship Caterina Accame is due down from Portland, to load 1,500,000 feet, for Antofagasta, Chili.

NEW YORK, June 16.—By a decision rendered yesterday in the appellate division Sheriff Hays is entitled to collect \$4775 in poundage fees from George J. Gould. This decision reverses the order of Supreme Court Judge Fitzgerald, in which it was held that the sheriff was only entitled to about \$150.

Mr. Gould is one of three defendants in a suit brought by John S. Jones an Ohio railroad man, to recover \$466,000 on an alleged contract by which Jones agreed to purchase for Gould, Joseph Ramsey Jr., and William E. Guy who constituted the Little Kanawha Syndicate, a large tract of coal land in Ohio. Jones alleges that he fulfilled his contract but was unable to collect either his commissions on the purchase or his expenses.

He got an attachment against George Gould Jr., and cash and securities valued at several thousand dollars on deposit with the Mercantile Trust Company were seized by the sheriff. Gould released the levy by giving an undertaking in \$500,000 to secure Jones. Gould then demurred to paying the \$4775 in poundage fees, and counsel for the sheriff appealed from Justice Fitzgerald's order which sustained Gould.

Justice McLaughlin, for the court, says that where a levy is made the sheriff's right to poundage fees is absolute and the amount is fixed by statute. Hence Gould is not entitled to the return of his property until he pays the statutory fees in full.

AGREEMENT RATIFIED.

NEW YORK, June 16.—Greater New York Council Brotherhood of Carpenters last night ratified an agreement arrived at yesterday afternoon between the carpenters and the master carpenters association, thereby bringing to an end the carpenters' strike. The men will return to work Monday.

By the agreement the Master Carpenters will raise the wages of the Brooklyn men from \$4 a day to \$4.50 a day and of the Manhattan men from \$4.50 a day to \$4.80 a day. The new wage scale of the Brooklyn men will go into effect August 15 and the new scale for Manhattan men July 1.

DALLES CITY ELECTION.

THE DALLES, Ore., June 16.—City election in The Dalles will be held next Monday, and a mass meeting was held in Vogt opera house last night for the purpose of nominating candidates for Mayor, City Treasurer and Water Commissioner at large. A contest in the mass meeting was expected, which brought out a large number of citizens. However, when Mayor Kelly's name was placed before the meeting by Circuit Judge W. L. Bradshaw no one presented the name of Mr. Phillips, and Mr. Kelly was nominated by acclamation. Ed. Kurtz and N. J. Sinnott were nominated without opposition for City Treasurer and Water Commissioner, respectively. Both are the present occupants of the offices to which they have been nominated.

It is rumored on the streets that Mr. Phillips, although his name was not mentioned in the meeting will be a candidate for Mayor.

MUST CLEAN UP.

CHICAGO, June 16.—The city health department yesterday sent its first official written notice to the packing companies at the Union Stock Yards to improve the sanitary conditions of their plants.

The packers were instructed that they must within three days discard the filthy tables and benches, provide cleaner rooms and tools, and correct some of the present insanitary conditions. Structural changes in the buildings, including new toilet rooms and more ventilation and light, must be made within 30 days.

British ship Brablock, lying at anchor this side of Tongue Point, for the purpose of engaging the foremast of that vessel for a leverage in lifting out the damaged foremast of the Stanford. The trick will be attempted early this week, but many seamen hereabout, are dubious of the efficacy of the plan, though it will be tried thoroughly.

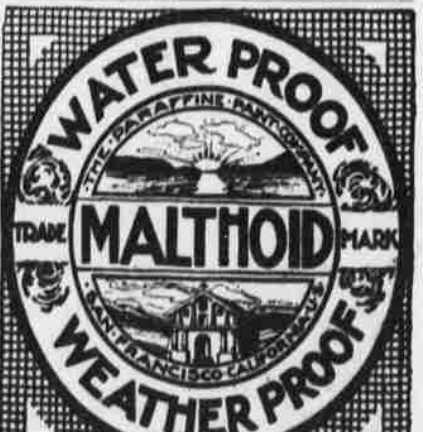
