PORTLAND, June 16.—A review of the wholesale business of Portland brings prominently to the front the fact that in all lines there is a heavier business being transacted by jobbers than was ever known before. In the history of the commercial life of the city there never was a time when the territory covered by our wholesale trade equaled the present.

This widening of territory is not altogether accounted for by reason of the diverting of trade formerly belonging to San Francisco to this market, for in many lines the extension is entirely independent and is simply the result of enterprise, and in recognition of Portland's advantages as a distributing point.

Inquiry from Alaska has increased, and along many lines the shipments North will be much heavier this season than ever before. This increase is particularly noteworthy in hardware, groceries, dry goods and foodstuffs. The clothing trade also has felt the improvement in Alaskan demands, and is reaching out to secure a larger share of that very desirable trade.

INQUEST IS HELD.

NEW YORK, June 16.—A special to the Times from Red Bank, N. J., says: Coroner Tetley held an inquest yesterday into the Central Railroad wreck at Eatontown on Monday, when George Van Duser of New York lost his life, and a score or more persons were injured.

The jury found that the wreck was due to an open switch through which the Atlantic City Flyer plunged, and that the switch was left open through the negligence of Conductor White and brakeman Bowne and Boyce of freight train No. 1, which had been switching just before the arrival of the express in Eatontown.

San Francisco is informed that its earthquake has been scientifically classified as third-class, and is entirely willing to let it stand as the record.
