

DOCK AND DECK NEWS IN THE UPPER COURT

Steamer J. B. Stetson Was in Collision With the Stanford.

FACT CONFIRMED YESTERDAY MAKES TWENTY SIX ORDERS

Alliance Gets Away For Eureka With Some Astoria People—Two of "Uncle Sam's" Pets Come in and Pass By—Docketlets.

The steamer Telegraph came down on spot time yesterday and left up at 2:30 with seventeen people on her register.

The British steamship Dulwich with a couple of millions of feet of good Oregon lumber aboard, arrived down the river yesterday morning, and went to sea, and Port Pirie, via Wellington, on the early tide.

The steamship Alliance came down from Portland early yesterday morning, and left out almost immediately for Eureka and Marshfield. Among her passengers hence were the following: Thomas Dealey, J. M. Barger, Dr. H. L. Henderson and W. M. Wallin.

The Jane L. Stanford is discharging ballast at the A. & C. pier, to a barge, and as soon as possible she will be overhauled, her wreckage cleared away, and the business of putting in a new foremast and the fitting of new spars, gear and sails will proceed with all dispatch.

The United States torpedo boat destroyers Paul Jones and Petrel arrived off the Columbia river bar about midnight on Sunday night, and the booming of their sirens could be distinctly heard all over the city. They entered port at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, where Captain Patterson, of the river pilots, took charge of the Paul Jones, and started for Portland, the Petrel following closely and carefully in her wake.

Captain Edward B. Smith, one of the principal owners of the barkentine Jane L. Stanford, now in this city arranging for the general repair of the vessel in the matter of injuries lately received while in collision off the Columbia bar, yesterday received the following dispatch from the San Francisco Merchants' Exchange:

"J. B. Stetson arrived in San Pedro, slightly damaged in collision with the Stanford."

This determines a much mooted question, and confirms the conclusion of the firm that it was the Stetson, out of Gray's Harbor on Tuesday last, was the steamer to blame for the untoward accident to the fine barkentine. The owners of the Stanford will at once file a libel against the Stetson in the sum of \$5000, if not more, and it is hardly probable that the claim will be disputed in court, nor out of it.

The steamship Roanoke arrived in port last night at 8 o'clock from Los Angeles, San Francisco and Eureka with 111 passengers in her cabins and a big manifest of freight. She was at the Callender dock for an hour or more and then left up for the metropolis. It is to be hoped she won't get lost on the way and have the marine reporter of the Oregonian telephoning queries to Astoria for news of her, while she is lying snug at her dock in Portland, as he did in the case of the F. A. Kilburn on Sunday last.

COUNCIL MEETING

City Fathers Transact Much Business.

MANY STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Lebeck Bill is Reduced to \$75 and it is Again Presented to the Council and Ordered Paid—Charter Commission Appointed.

The city council met last evening in the city hall with all members present, except Belland. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. A petition was read from Henry Jones stating that he had removed his saloon from precinct No. 6 to Commercial street and asking permission to conduct business in the new location. The request was granted.

A petition was read and filed from the property owners on Grand avenue asking that the street between Sixth and Seventh streets be not improved.

A petition from the chairman of the Fourth of July committee asking to be allowed to use the city hall steps for the exercises on the Fourth was granted.

A petition from a property owner on Fifth street asking to be allowed to use part of the street at the corner of Fifth and Duane for a yard, was referred to the street committee.

A petition from property owners on Irving avenue asking to be allowed to improve that street between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets by the installation of cement sidewalks, was granted.

A communication was received from the Fourth of July committee inviting the council to march in the parade on the 4th. The invitation was accepted.
