PORTLAND, June 18.—The closing of water communication into and out of San Francisco has not extended to other coast ports, and Portland jobbers are not, therefore, disturbed in handling along the coast trade.

Fresh Meats and Poultry.

There were quite light receipts of dressed meats this morning, and only moderate supplies of poultry. Monday is customarily a dull day for these goods, and today is no exception to the rule. No change in prices is noted.

Butter and Eggs.

The butter market is steady, with occasional claim among dealers that if the supplies continue to be received in same volume at last week, prices will shade off. Cheese is in very full supply and price inclined to weaken.

Eggs are generally quoted 21½¢ to 22¢ this morning, with a decidedly firmer tendency than was observable last week. Supply is not holding out extra well, though there is no evidence of an early shortage.
