PORTLAND, June 20.—Front street was well supplied this morning with poultry, and dealers agree in reporting a good demand, especially for hens and large Springs.

Among the largest dealers, however, it is held that the present demand will take care of even larger shipments that have ruled for the past week.

There was a decline of \$1.50 a case on Lion coffee announced yesterday, but the drop did not extend to other brands.

Fresh Meats and Poultry. There were quite light receipts of dressed meats this morning, and only moderate supplies of poultry.

Eggs and Butter. The fact that Eastern eggs are coming to this market carload lots indicates an abnormal demand, or at least a much greater demand for the season of the year than was to have been expected earlier in the season.
