SUB-DIVIDE LAND

Reclaimed Land to Be Given to Settlers in Small Acreage.

MANY STATES ASK FOR MONEY


Court Reviews Are Now Important Features of All Delegated Powers, Since the Rate Bill Discussion.

ASTORIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., June 20.—In the effort to subdivide reclaimed lands between the largest number of persons, the House of Representatives recently passed a measure providing that when a project embraced land fit for fruit production in large measure, the Secretary of the Interior could limit the tract taken by an individual to ten acres. When the Senate passed the measure, the limit was raised to twenty acres, and with this conflict the measure went to conference, where it is probable that the compromise will be the mean figure. It is stated by officers of the reclamation service that some of the land being irrigated will prove of great value for fruits and truck garden produce. Instead of permitting one settler to acquire large holdings of such land, and using it for the relatively less valuable purpose of cereals, etc., the officials would prefer to force diversified products and high-grade horticultural crops.

Reclamation Fund.
Defense of the reclamation fund has come to absorb much of the time of the Western Congressmen. In the House the fund has a warm friend in the person of Chairman Lacey, of the Public Lands Committee, while in the Senate the chairman of this committee, Senator Hansbrough, of North Dakota, led the onslaught for the first great divergence from the primary reclamation purpose. A North Carolina man has just introduced a bill to appropriate \$1,000,000 from the fund for draining the great Dismal swamp, of that state and Virginia, and expects to press the measure with all possible energy at the next session. Texas has been struggling to come into the reclamation group with the privilege of sharing equally with the other sixteen members. This state reserved all of her public land, when entering the Union, and was later paid \$1,000,000 for the area claimed by the young republic which now constitutes parts of Indian Territory, Missouri, Kansas and Colorado. In view of this enjoyment of the full proceeds from her own extensive public lands, much opposition to Texas taking a share of the reclamation fund has developed, and the effort will probably be defeated. The general proposition to use portions of the fund for swamp land drainage throughout the country has been mentioned earlier, and has strong backing in the East. Active efforts will have to be maintained by the West to protect the reclamation fund inviolate from uses other than irrigation of arid tracts.

Court Reviews.
Court reviews are the important features of all delegated powers, since the profound discussion over the railway-rate bill, in which the question was developed in more pointed form than ever before in the nation's history. In framing the amendment to the agricultural bill, which is to force upon the meat packers more stringent and detailed inspection, a proviso is being insisted upon for appeal from the Secretary of Agriculture's ruling to the courts in any important question. Power to appeal from the post office department rulings in certain cases is also being requested. The power of the Secretary of Agriculture to enforce a criminal code while governing the forest reserve ranges, has been disputed, and a delegation has just visited Washington asking that this power be vested but with the proviso that an appeal shall lie to the courts. More ready appeal from the rulings of the Secretary of Treasury in customs questions, has been agitated for some time, the point made being of the few instances where the secretary's rulings of several years have later been reversed by the courts. Court review from mandates and decrees of executive officers seems to have become suddenly popular, which forces the question, are the people becoming apprehensive of the enlarged scope of legislative influence entered upon by the present aggressive chief executive and his official family? While there are many flings at the courts, yet it seems that the people are seeking this arbitration in many affairs which were previously largely left to the discretion of department heads.
