HORRIBLE DEATH.

NEW YORK, June 22.—After more than 24 hours of pumping and digging the bodies of the two men trapped by a blow out in one of the Pennsylvania Company's East River tunnels were recovered yesterday. Instead of being blown out into the river through the break at the base of the tunnel as had been supposed, they were caught by the inrush of soft mud and water in the lower chamber of the shaft after the air pressure had found vent and were there found in postures indicating that they had strangled by inches.

Their feet were fast in the heavy mud and there were indications that they had made desperate efforts to release themselves. Both bodies were found in standing postures.

IMPRIMIS, THE BAR

Devoted Oregon Citizen Expresses His Convictions.

COLUMBIA BAR MEANS OREGON

He Pleads For the Deepening of the Commercial Channels for the Good of the Whole State, Whatever May Be Employed.

The following communication has been received and is as follows:

"Among the many schemes proposed to advance the commercial interests and enhance the traffic importance of the State of Oregon, I consider the most imperative to be the deepening of the channel of the Columbia river bar.

"Many of those who have employed their energies and brains in solving this problem, have passed away and are almost forgotten. Their ideas on the great subject varied broadly, perhaps, and many times their motives were impugned and their opinions scoffed at as being selfish, or as if they were but too willing to do anything, or talk for anything, that might advance the interests, of their particular city, or locality, as far as the present writer is concerned, however, he is willing, and anxious, to do, or say anything that will redound to the credit and interest of the whole state.

"The improvement of the bar of the Columbia river was supposed to be finished in 1896; the United States engineer returned the unexpended balance of the appropriation then on hand back to the federal treasury; the depth of the channel water then on the bar was, say, 30 feet at low tide; in a couple of years it was 26 feet at low tide, and the depth now available is variously estimated from a scant 21 to an easy 24 feet, and the never-ending controversy on this vital subject, as between the bar pilots and the federal engineers has been agog ever since and still wages.

"Now we do not care whether there are 22 feet, or 23 feet, a little less, or a little more, on the Columbia bar; or whether the tide gauge at Fort Stevens and the tide gauge at the end of the jetty agree, or not, nor as to any difference in their readings, etc., etc.; but what we do know, and care, about, is that there is not enough water on the bar, at present, at any stage of the tide, to accommodate the class of shipping that should, and would, come to the Columbia if only the available depth was there; the tendency being to build larger, and deeper draft vessels.

"We should, as Oregonians, see to it that there is channel water enough on that bar to allow these new bottoms, and all others of greater draft, to get into the waters of the State of Oregon; Astoria where they go after that, we do not care, whether they load here, or go on to Vancouver, or to Portland, and discharge, and load, their cargoes, but we do care to have them dock for all purposes on the Oregon side of the river, if it is possible to do so.

"The remedies proposed, other than the south jetty, are, the employment of the dredge Chinook, or a better one if it is to be had, putting her in full charge of a competent, honest master who would 'lay a course' on the bar and keeps dredging on that course and not change it; another proposed remedy is a northshore jetty, a couple of miles in length projected from Cape Hancock in a southwesterly direction, which would narrow the river entrance and make a permanent and deep channel. If this north jetty is not built, it is claimed that the bar channel will shift round, from north to south, and back again, as the storms and ocean currents may happen to force it, thereby making it a very uncertain quantity as to course and depth.

"Whatever is best for the bar, dredge jetty, or whatsoever it shall be let us have it, and achieve the prime essential of Oregon's commerce, where-soever it may be received, or despatched. Imprimis, the bar!

"If this brief letter shall have the effect of arousing the attention and interest of men who know more of this grave and vital subject than I presume to know, it will not have been written in vain.
